IN STUART'S OWN WORDS

Good evening and welcome to the most overdue piece of nonsense in history.

I've been promising to write this in answer to a lot of letters and queries about the group for far too long and really no excuses are going to be very convincing, although it has been an exceedingly busy year. I mainly want to try and explain how we in the group feel about some stuff that's been talked about in the magazine.

I think for a group like ourselves, who do realise that people interested in us are not, as most bands seem to think, a vast market place in which to ply our wares. We must always be as open as we can about how the group functions.

The first thing to talk about should be the live show. We are a group who try and connect the ideas in our songs as directly and emplicitly as possible when on stage. I feel that doing this brings about a close bond of friendship between group and audience so the two are not separate entities performing for the gratification of the other but touching the sheer emotional release that music is capable of. It means that every single gig we do is unique in atmosphere and event. Such a high goal is not always easily attained, we are not fallible, but this year we have only had one show we were displeased with (a festival in Holland) and we have played in 14 or more countries this year. I can assure you it is just as frustrating for us in the band and crew as for anyone else.

Requests for songs is another difficult one to cover, although we would dearly love to play our entire recorded works every evening it would be a physical impossibility to do this and do more than two gigs in a week. What we have done this year is extend our live set substantially, which can be a bit unfair on support acts, to the extent that on our next tour we will be playing 23 songs over about 2½ hours.

When it comes to the question of people singing along during songs, I find rather than detracting from the songs they attain their full potential. Music can be a very powerful communicative force and if people can identify with our songs and take them into their lives so much so that they would be happy to sing them themselves, I will actively encourage them, for there can be no stronger confirmation of our work. I don't write songs to keep them to myself and we won't play live shows to prove how untouchable we are. The sharing of songs is a touching and soulful act, no-one should be cynical about such simple, natural beauty.

I know there have been times when people have been disapointed by the group leaving gigs early or late or in a hurry, these have been rare occasions but unavoidable ones. As the group grows demands on our time for interviews, business (heave) meetings, overnight travel grow with us.

There have been occasions when we have actually spent longer signing autographs after the gig than we have done on stage. We can never be available for everyone all of the time but we try to do so whenever possible. I myself have been guilty of leaving very quickly when playing in Scotland so I can drive home for a long awaited night in my own bed, not a chance to turn down lightly.

As you can see, the group are forever in a multiple of situations, ones which we can only trust to our own judgement, our own consciences and our own inspirations, as we did when we began the group. We are

only human and for us to satisfy everyone is unrealistic, but we try damned hard to do so, don't judge us too harshly.

It is a marvellous experience for me, playing in this band and we would all like to say thanks for your enduring support and friendship, it is moving.





THE SEER Track by Track

Well they certainly made us wait for this album!, but it was worth it,

as I think this is the best offering the band have given us to date. As a friend of mine commented; "It's just that bit different". I decided not to write this article immediatley after it's release because I find it more useful to give yourself time to get to know the songs better, and subsequently a fuller review can be given.

Side one opens with the now legendary LOOK AWAY, although (in my opinion) not the best on the album, the unique yet simple guitar work on the verses gives the song an edge over it's contemporaries. The song also contains some of Adamson's best vocals, as he seems to be stretching himself more than ever. It is the freshness and originality that make the song such a worthy single.

Next up is THE SEER which in my opinion is totally mind-blowing. This is Big Country at their best - their very best!! The lyrics convey the message of the song most clearly and again Adamson has stretched his vocal range even further. Also Kate Bush's harmonious contribution fits in well with the folkiness and atmosphere of the song. This song seems to be completed and fuller version of ALL FALL TOGETHER and WINTER SKY. This seems to be exactly what Big Country have been searching for through the aforementioned tracks.

THE TEACHER. What can I can about one of my favourite track. The guitar work and melodic use of feedback (?!) make this song truly dynamic My only criticism is the tame chorus. I feel that such a powerful song song could have had a more powerful chorus. This would have nicely put an edge/sharpness on the song. However, apart from this the song is 'that bit different' and deserved more success in the charts.

I WALK THE HILL follows, this song is back to the usual Big Country sound. The 'bagpipe' effect is once again present, but of course it is used just as well as before. This track, live, is truly blistering, but on record lack the energy and power the song deserves.

This song happens to be my favourite track Next we have EILEDON. on the album. The introduction to this song in particular makes this track outstanding. The theme of the song is also conveyed very well, and I feel that Stuart is trying to include a 'wee' bit of social comment. It's the dynamic and forceful use of guitars that make this my favourite track.

Side two opens with ONE GREAT THING which is one of the most powerful songs I've ever heard about hte subject, peace. Again a more traditional Big Country flavour to it, but the songs power and forcefulness certainly convey Stuart's (and Tony's) thoughts. It is also refreshing to hear the rest of the lads have a stab at the vocals on the choruses.


Following this is a slow number HOLD THE HEART. Somehow I feel that Big Country feel uneasy when it comes to slow numbers, and subsequently this uneasiness make the song a bit cumbersome. On the positive side, the song does give us a breather from the powerful, rocking tunes which preceed and follow it. One could almost say, it provides a bit of light relief. (scuse me for chipping in here, but... I think this is a wonderful track, I think Stuart's romantic side is brilliantly portrayed. It is far from uneasy and cumbersome. I speak on behalf of all the girls who wrote in as well as myself. My only criticism is that I feel it would have been better as a last track or followed by EILEDON. Just as your'e floating off on a cloud of bliss you thud down to earth shattered by Remembrance Day. Not pleasant. I'd rather retire on that cloud, having already rocked myself silly to R D, (I love that too, by the way) Andy)

Next up is REMEMBRANCE DAY which is truly captivating. Marks drumming must get a mention here - although he should be praised for contribution throughout the album. On this track in particular, Mark's drumming aids, considerably, the powerful lyrics and guitar work. The song also contains a lot of energy and passion, this is reflected equally well on vinyl, as it is live. And this is no easy task!

THE RED FOX is the 'Porrohman' of the album because of the total change in tempo and direction in the middle of the song. Apart from this the song is another gem because, again, 'it's that bit different'; the power and passion that we have come to expect from Big Country, is ever present.

To close the album we have THE SAILOR. We see yet another change in tempo put to clever use; one minute we are sitting peacefully listening to a pleasant swaying tune, next we are treated to a fast, stormy, powerful tunewhich beautifully finishes and rounds off the album.

We were getting desperate so agreeing to split the fine if we were stopped by the filth, we drove the last stretch to the turn-off on the hard shoulder. It was all in vain, when we arrived at 12.05 we were told that our flight had gone. OH SHIT!

After frantic phone calls we were back in business, another flight was arranged for four hours later.

We were met at Brussels airport by a couple of guys from the record company, and they whisked us away to \mathbf{t} he nearby venue, where we finally met up with Andy, and put up with a barage of stick for being late. (not just from me you understand but from everyone in Brussels!!).

The gig was at the university but it was a bit different from the University Halls at home as it was a Lecture Hall and didn't look as though it would hold much over 1,000 people. The band were doing the soundcheck when we arrived —so this is when they play the B-sides: Winter Sky, Restless Natives, All of Us, etc.

Afterwards we chatted with Stuart, who seemed pleased to see üs all. (amazed would be more appropriate - hint at kind of stick given at the time!) The rest of the European Tour had gone really well and tonight was the last gig. Stuart assured us that even though they'd been very active during 1986, Big Country will not be taking next year off!

There was a short wait until the gig kicked off, as there was no support band. There were a few empty seats at the back of the hall when the band came on, but the front rows were occupied by some very enthusiastic Brits, who more than made up for the lack of local support.

Tonight's set was the same as that on the last British Tour starting off with the dynamic Wonderland, Fields of Fire and Where the Rose is Sown. Then a couple of the best songs from The Seer: Remembrance Day and my current favourite I Walk On The Hill, Just A Shadow and Steeltown were followed by Look Away, which got most of the locals going. They also managed to sing along to Chance pretty well, before the evergreen Porrohman and mysterious The Teacher. In a Big Country, Inwards and Harvest Home bringing the set to a rousing finish. The encores were the highlight for

me, starting with my first chance to hear the (then) current single One Great Thing, which just about summed up our day. The Storm was followed by a real treat, the first time they have ever played Restless Natives live. It sounded ace to me, and I hope to hear it a few more times in the future. The audience did quite well keeping up Lost Patrol, before the band returned for the last time to play Tracks of my Tears, Honky Tonk Woman and the amazing scratch version of Fields of Fire, which now even includes the riff from Run DMC's, Walk This Way!

Afterwards, we met the lads backstage and travelled with them on the tour bus to the hotel, which was a real five star job. Stuart left to catch a ferry back to England, but the others weren't returning until the next day so we met up with them in the hotel bar, where we stayed until the small hours. Here we were entertained by a wailing Belgie at a piano, who became increasingly irritating as the evening progressed, he didn't even do requests (well not ours anyway!) Another character we came accross insisted on extolling the virtues of French cigarettes as opposed to the Belgian variety, and also recommended the Trappist Monk's beer, they didn't have any behind the bar which was handy!

In spite of not getting much sleep, we decided to get up early(ish), so that we could have a look around Brussels before going home. VUB REPORT

M.G.P. were fully booked and Concert Promotions had cancelled their trip, the only way to see Big Country in Brussels was to make our own way. The search for the V.U.B. (which was the only information we had) started with a Liverpool to Dover coach on Monday afternoon. We changed at London and arrived in Dover at 8.00pm.

With our Euro-Rovers we boarded the Ostend Ferry for the 10pm sailing, which was a four hour trip. Weighed down with millions of Belgian francs we got into Ostend at shortly after 2am. It was good to see that the first train into Brussels was as early as 4am so a two hour wait wasn't too bad. What wasn't so good was that half my money had gone on the fare. The train journey took a couple of hours. Trying to get some sleep was impossible as the train became full of wide awake, alert commuters. Their sprightly, happy nature for such an early hour was disturbing.

The large train station in Brussels was cold and deserted so we made our way out to find a nearby cafe. A friendly waitress gave us written details on a beer mat on how to find the V.U.B. The first thing to do was to find the right tram. A #90 was required and on the tram a co-passenger after reading the beer mat, told us where to get off (??). At last at about 8.30am we found the VUB (Vilrije University Buildings, YIPPEE!, a University gig with lots of students.

With about 12 hours to wait for the concert, we constantly toured the University complex trying to keep warm and stay awake. After many visits to the cafe, we eventually fell asleep on some concrete benches near to the Trans-Am trucks.

During our rest the weather really changed, we awoke with 'bronzies' and the sun was beating down. We spoke to Les King, he told us the band would be arriving at about 5.30pm, which they did. The soundcheck followed about half an hour later, so we followed on in to watch. The venue was very small and an all seater. Each seat had a pull down table, this was probably so the students could lean on something for a decent kip during lectures. Big Country were really relaxed during the soundcheck, this was the last date of a three week European tour, so maybe that had something to do with this fun-filled soundcheck. The band took everyone by surprise by breaking into a totally unheard version of 'Winter Sky'. There was slight setback when Stuart (or anyone else) couldn't remember the lyrics, despite this they ran through the song a few times and it sounded superb.

As the souncheck came to an end, the competition winner, Barry Gray and his friend Simon Ashdown were introduced to Stuart. The atmosphere was distinctly British, especially as about a dozen fans with M.G.P. had bunked in. Shortly after Big Country left the stage, the rest of the crowd started to come in. There was no support act so there wasn't too long to wait before BC were on. The rest of the travelling fans from Britain took over the front couple of rows, so we all had a great view at the foot of the stage. At 8.15 BC came on to a rousing reception and went immediately into 'Wonderland'. Big Country were playing the usual 'Seer Tour' set and were in top form, They even included a couple of extra tracks. The first was a knock out version of 'Restless Natives' which sounded even better live than the vinyl product. What a future single it would make.

The second newie was 'One Great Thing' and before BC played it, Stuart dedicated it to the fans who were a long way from home, a great gesture and one accepted with massive appreciation from the followers it was meant for.

Big Country gave everything they had on stage, to think it had been a year of constant touring, it's incredible to think they can still put so much into their performance. The gig ended with 'Fields of Fire' (scratch mix) and Big Country left to a great send off.

It was now time to rush out and try and make the last train to Brussels. Our tram, however, was not in time to catch the 11.30 service, that meant we had missed the overnight ferries. The next train into Ostend was at 5.30am, the only form of shelter was the customary freezingcold waiting room, sleeping bags for Christmas please Santa.

We eventually got into Ostend early Wednesday morning and got the 10pm ferry back to Dover. After two coaches we finally got back to Liverpool at about midnight. Our three day trek had come to an end, we enjoyed every minute of it.



It was along time coming but it was well worth the The articles made very good reading, very informative as well as a great laugh, Bruce's diary was really funny. Within seconds of opening the envelope I had forgiven you, you made my day. I have one complaint, that is the letter page, it was a bit of astrain on the eyes. Most of the letters were about Don Mitchell's comments I bet you received many more, most of them unsuitable for printing! good to have a bit of criticism but all he did was slag BC, not a good word, there must be something wrong with him.

I have only praise for BC, they outshine all other groups in my opinion and they continually produce magnificent quality material which raises the spirits, especially mine. 

LIMEHOUSE REVIEW October 15th, Big Country played to an audience of 200 just E) at the Limehouse Studios in London's West India Docks. broadcast live via satellite by CSN (College Satellite Network) and was sponsored by Pepsi Cola. Also on the programme were Buddy Curtess D and the Grasshoppers (who replaced Spandau Ballet) and videos of Simple Minds and Simply Red. FISH MARKET T DRTH SECTION WEST INDIA Top of the bill of course were Big Country, which is why the Fan These tickets were limited to 150 and were given free to club members on a first ring first served BASIN hasis .WLF SECTION DOCKS The Limehouse Studio was very upmarket and in the reception there were lots of photos taken from famous programmes filmed on the premises. There were also crates and crates of free Pepsi everywhere. Before the cameras started to roll the crowd were asked to do several loud cheers in order to check the sound levels. The real cheers came at 9.45 when Big Country came on. ➤ Big Country's playing time was scheduled for an hour so several of the 🚻 numbers were left out. As expected, the ommited songs were the longer tracks, i.e. Porrohman, The Storm, The Teacher, F.O.F. (scratch), plus the groups cover versions of Tracks of My Tears and Honky Tonk Woman It was great though to see Restless Natives still included in the material that was performed. The small crowd lucky to be present joined BC in singing Auld Lang Sync WALL before the satellite link finished. The Club members that attended the Limehouse were treated to a great evening, not only did they see Big Country in action, but the pure nature of the concert made it a privilege to be there. MOESCON CT. 3 ROAD CROSSHARBOOK

At the time of writing (Mid. Oct.) the Big Country U.K. Discography stands at 11 singles and 3 Albums. These records officially appear in 43 variations. Those fans and collectors who bought the 12" Almanac copy of 'One Great Thing' can put the valium away, the discography include in the sleeve is incorrect. Rest assured 'Harvest Home' and 'Fields of Fire' were not issued in clear vinyl. This issue of Country Club includes a full and precise UK listing of all Big Country's releases. I've put the records in an order that will be easy to follow, you will be able to see at a glance what is needed to complete your collection. Issue 14 of the mag will feature an article on Imports.

All UK 7" singles are fairly easy to obtain in mint condition from specialist 'oldies' dealers, there are however, some label variations on a couple of the later singles. Although some people won't find this important, to certain collectors it could well be crucial. Early copies of 'Look Away' came withand orange global design, whereas later copies had a plain silver label. 'The Teacher' followed a similar pattern, early copies had a blue global design, and later issues had a plain label.

Big Country to date have released five 7" double packs and two further records with special sleeves. 'The Rose' double pack in the yellow sleeve is the hardest to find and sells for around£5. 'East of Eden' in the poster sleeve is another record not easy to obtain, the other five 7" special editions shouldn't prove difficult to get hold of.

The 12" releases total 16, up to and including three formats of 'One Great Thing'. Without question the outstanding rarity in this section is the 12" 'In A Big Country' (4 track edition). This record in a plain red cover is the only vinyl release in the UK to include 'Heart and Soul'. If you are looking for this particular record in mint condition, the asking price will be between £8-15. As usual, shop around the secondhand stalls and record fayres, you may get lucky and find it for a lot less.

In the shaped or picture disc category, Big Country have just three items, 'Look Away' described as a 7" cut out disc is easy to find. The Scotland shape picture disc of 'Fields of Fire' and the 12" picture disc of 'Chance' are not 'too difficult to find but are quite expensive. Don't pay over the true value for these records. I've seen early picture discs sell at record fayres for £5-8. In the October edition of 'Record Collector' one dealer was selling 'Chance' (PD) for £15, which is way over the odds. The same dealer want £12.50 for the 'Rose' double pack, which again is much too expensive.

On the album front, Big Country'S 3 albums are available in six different ways. The only album which is 'collectable' and therefore hard to obtain is.'The Crossing' in the red sleeve.

All of Big Country's singles and albums are issued in several forms other than the copy available in the shops. These are very collectable and can be quite expensive. The easiest of these to obtain are the 12" white labels, which normally sell for £5 or £6. These 'promo's' are always widely available at Record Fayres. More expensive and harder to find are one side album promo's or 'test pressings' which sell for around£10-15. Acetates with official studio labels (containing hand written credits) are very rare, they sell for between £15-30.

Record Collecting

Even more rare than acetates, because of the limited pressings, are, special preview discs. Prior to the release of 'The Crossing' a 12" White label, numbered sides 1 and 2 like a standard promo, featured 'Chance/Inwards'. These discs are issued as a 'sampler' from a forthcoming L.P. and will fetch a very high asking price. The 'Chance/Inwards' record is the only one I know of, in preview form. If anyone knows of any other rare back to back tracks, drop me a line. I'm sure BC collectors would be eager to know about it.

That's all on the UK scene. If you have any BC rarities from this country please let me know and I'll include the details in the next issue of Country Club. To make the Import article more interesting, I'd also like you to send in your import lists. The article on foreign goodies will be full of surprises. Did you know, fo instance, that in Canada 'Fields of Fire' 7" was backed with... 'Close Action'. More about that in #14.
