INTRODUCING HEDD RECORDS

On reflection It's hard to believe that a record company could turn down The Beatles, saying that it was only a passing fad; and anyway they wrote their own songs and that doesn't happen, does it? Well it happened, even if the record company in question did sign the Rolling Stones the week after. It goes to show that it is easier said than done and there is that element of luck to take into consideration.

Having worked in A & R departments for various major record companies for the past six years I have seen how and why this can happen, after all it is a powerful money spinning business, with heavy investments, politics and power struggles within the company can often dictate whether or not a band will be successful, also apart from lawyers, accountants, in some cases marketing departments, the employees are amateur, there are no training schools, you learn by experience. Who knows maybe at the expense of some bands.

After the punk explosion record companies were flung wide open, for the first time the walls around them were penetrated, they were vulnerable Streetwise entrepeneurs were now calling the shots, hence the dutch auctions, i.e. large advances for new bands, sometimes in the region of £200,000, and you must realise this is an advance to the band, the record company still has to pay for recordings, video etc... This obviously leads to pressure to gain success in the first year, otherwise it can get too expensive to continue, the band are dropped and probably never heard of again. So you see there are many deciding factors on today's music.

I have now set up a record label, HEDD RECORDS, with lan Grant and Alan Edwards.

I feel the time is right for this venture in that we pool our experiences, it's a smaller set up, so little or no politics. We have complete control and can still compete with the majors by using their machinery. Also new bands don't feel so alienated by us like they do with the giants, 'a more sympathetic ear', I suppose you could say.

Taking all this into consideration, we feel we are able to nurture and develop new talent.

We have just signed our first band, GAYE BYKERS ON ACID, some of you might already have heard of them. We find them an exciting proposition. They already have a following, which is an important base to have, after all, you the public have the final decision on a band's future.

There is a saying that the record business has been going in 10 year cycles. 1957 Rock & Roll was born. 1967 saw the rise of such bands as the Beatles and the Stones, to name but a few. 1977 Punk Rock exploded.

1987? Who knows, my guess is it's labels like Hedd Records and of course Gaye Bykers On Acid.

Prince's Trust Gala Wembley Arena

While hardly the second coming, it was pleasant enough to see Ringo Starr, a faintly ridiculous figure buried amid Mark Brzezicki's enormous kit, and George Harrison with a marvellous, swept-back, Clint Eastwood look about him,, muddle their way through hesitant versions of "While My Guitar Gently Weeps" and "Here Comes the Sun". One could not help but register a keen sense of irony during the grand finale how-ever, when Starr came forward and led "With a Little Help From My Friends" in his flat, inflexible voice while flankedon either side by Ben E. King, Boy George, Elton John, Tony Hadley, Dave Edmunds, Bryan Adams, Mark King, Labi Siffre, Eric Clapton, Jeff Lynne, Leo Sayer and Midge Ure, to name some of the more accomplished vocalists.

Prior to these high jinks, the rock aristocracy's annual vari-

ety show had progressed with its usual share of winning moments — Eric Clapton's poignant reading of "Wonderful Tonight", Ben E. King's epic "Stand By Me" — and disasters, notably Go West's "Don't Look Down", advice seemingly taken literally by the person at the controls of the mixing desk at that point.

Faced with the challenge of opening the evening, Curiosity Killed the Cat were plainly. out of their depth, but Alison Moyet proved livelier than expected and Bryan Adams prompted the first signs of life from the crowd. The party pieces that ensued were remarkable, if nothing else, for their apparent homogeneity. "Running in the Family", "If I Was", "Behind the Mask" and "Through the Barricades" all merged into the broad framework provided by Midge Ure's deft musical direction.

Royal patronage of the rock church was a prospect that seemed almost as unlikely 20 years ago as that of a full Beatles reunion does today, but Princess Diana and Prince Charles dutifully stayed until the last encore, a massed reprise of "Stand By Me".

HOW THE CLUB WAS WON

A lot of people write in and ask about the running of the club, and how did I get the job in the first place. Well it's all very boring really, but I'll tell you anyway. Are you sitting comfortably? Then I'll begin...

First of all I have to burst a bubble, I do not sit on Stuart's knee taking notes! I don't have much direct contact with the band at all, which will no doubt surprise a lot of you. I sit, that is when I'm not moved out, in the corner of an office with some other beings, whether they are human or not is still in dispute, but I do know they have nothing to do with either me or Big Country. I'm miles away from anyone remotely connected to the Big Band. I probably see them a lot less than a lot of you. I go down to London at magazine time but I can assure you that Big Country don't hide out in the Grant-Edwards office either, I have never seen anyone famous there before this visit when Billy Duffy breezed by.

HOW DID I GET THE JOB? By being in a place at a time. Somedays it can be considered the right place, and somedays... I became involved when Martin could no longer cope on his own. At first I did the memberships and Martin carried on with the info service. Martin later found full-time employment in another part of the country, leaving the situation vacant it seemed logical that I should take over.

WHAT DOES THE WORK INVOLVE? More than I ever dreamed! I wasn't surprised by the amount of mail that flooded in, but I soon learned that I needed a system and quick. First the mail is sorted into: membership applications, members letters and non-members letters. Applications are given a numbered member card, a member pack is sent out and details are put into the computer which files the members alphabetically. For cross reference the application forms are filed numerically, you wouldn't believe the amount of letters I get without a name or number and even address. The number, so many of you hold so much store by, is a reference number for me, just li'l ole me. It tells me how many members I have and therefore how many mags or whatever I have to get printed. It has no magic, it bears no relation to how long you have been a member, or how much you care about Big Country. I won't be drawn into any kind of discrimination.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE MONEY? No secrets - it pays the bills. No profit is made, it just about manages to keep it's head above water over the year. If it did by some miracle 'earn', the money would be fed back into the club so that you the members would benefit. A fee is paid to Acme for the use of their phone, fax, telex, computer, bank account, typewriters, and franking machine. It would cost a good deal more if I tried to set up independently and would also be a lot more time consuming. All labour is voluntary. I do it because I care. I care about you, and of course about Big Country but not just because I rate them as musicians. They are genuinely the most sincere blokes I have ever met in the music business. Because you put your faith in me, my conscience would not let me betray that trust.


WHAT KIND OF LETTERS DO YOU GET? I don't think there is any kind of letter I don't get. Apart from the usual I love BC type, I get letters from members just telling me what they are up to, I feel like a pen friend sometimes. I get problem letters, as in Clare Rayner type. I try and help, and I have I've had the thank you letters to prove it, even from a Dad who said I'd helped him to understand his daughter, I'm just so wonderful!!! I even had a suicide letter, I now write regularly to the very much alive person who says I helped. I've had obscene letters, they just make me laugh, some of them are very imaginative! I have letters from people who have just 'lost' a relation, the other week I was informed of the death of a member, I was quite upset because he used to write in quite regularly. I have letters from people with terminal illness saying

Big Country's music gives them the strength to face the illness, you wouldn't believe the courage some people have in the face of adversity, it makes me feel so wretched.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE LETTERS? Obscene ones get pinned on the wall! The rest I reply to as quickly as possible. Most of your questions have been asked so many times that I could answer them in my sleep. Sometimes I'm stumped and have to call in the calvary, sometimes they too need to call in the reserves, which causes delay to the reply. I answer all the letters myself, either I type them or someone types them for me; I was told by my junior school teacher that, my writing was atrocious, things haven't changed much. Sometimes the typed version is gobbledygook, even after two years Sheila can't read my writing. Questions on record collecting are sent to Mike Bartram, my record collecting days are long gone. Once upon a time I knew records by number (STAX 108 & STAX 128, any takers? they are the only ones I remember) and I could give a knowledgeable history on every groove. I like many others found my purse couldn't keep up with my 'habit', I now only buy albums in whatever version the shop has and the odd single. I don't even know track names half the time, I have to say the one that goes 'la la la'. For all you that complain about the many mixes, shapes, sleeves, sizes, colours and flavours, I only have three very run of the mill BC singles.

WHO DECIDES WHAT GOES IN THE MAGAZINE? I go to London for a meeting with Ian Grant, we both make suggestions and yeah or nay them there and then. Sometimes such as now there is little happening which makes a mag very hard to produce. Other times there is so much that it's hard to stick to the deadline because new stuff keeps cropping up to be included. It is a very busy time, I love it, suddenly it's all systems go and then to see a little book at the end of it is very satisfying. Then the really boring bit begins, sticking it into envelopes, and posting them you start dreaming about them! The mail comes in faster than ever, and we start all over again...

A spokesman for Chartz record shop in Sunderland said: "It's a piece of good news — Big Country is a brilliant band, and its records have always sold very well. They're smashing in concert and have a lot of fans in this area.

Big Country rose out of the ashes of the Skids, one of the most successful post-punk outfits who split up at the turn of the decade. When Skids frontman Robert Jobson left to pursue his Armoury Show, his sidekick guitarist Stuart Adamson teamed up with fellow Scot Bruce Watson to form Big Country, the pioneering Celtic rock band.

The two guitar players brought in ace sessionman Mark Brzezicki on drums and Tony Butler on bass to bring their fusion of new wave and bagpipe droning guitars to life

Their first album, "The Crossing," was a gigantic success with both critics and fans. The singles "Harvest Home" and "Fields of Fire" heralded their arrival on the "Top of the

Pops" scene.
Since then they've established themselves with some brilliant live gigs and a reputation for stagecraft fill of power and passion. The chart success was continued with the albums "Steeltown" and "The Seer" and singles like "East of Eden" and "Chance."





Import albums are not as interesting as singles, mainly because they are exactly the same as the UK versions. There are, however, a couple of exceptions. Due to the success of 'The Crossing', BC's debut album in New Zealand it was re-issued in the blue cover with a free copy of the 12" 'Fields of Fire' c/w 'In a Big Country'. This album. marketed in Australasia, sold in most good HMV shops for about £9, today it would probably sell for more than that. In Greece 'The Crossing' was released in the red cover with the words 'Nol in Britain' printed on the front cover. The standard red cover was also released in Greece. Both albums sold for just £2.00 in a Liverpool shop last year. For the same price a Dutch 'Steeltown' gatefold and French 'Steeltown' single cover were found, sadly this shop closed down as quickly as it opened. (The guys who ran it will be out soon!)

There is a cassette with a difference available; 'The Seer' with tracks from 'Steeltown', the final three tracks on side B are 'Just a Shadow', 'Rose' and 'Come Back to Me'. The tape comes from Indonesia, it comes in a white box with a picture of the cover on it. It is issued by Billboard and has a complete lyric sheet, the catalogue number is BB10230.



After completing this article I received a copy of Record Collector. includes singles from the US, Canada, Holland, Portugal, Italy, and Spain, all at reasonable prices. Well worth checking out if you're a collector. Record Collector also has many UK items for sale, promos, double packs etc. They also have a very rare double pack of Big Country playing cards These cards show 'The Crossing' album design in red and blue. They were given out to promote the album in '83 and are as the ad says, very rare.

When ordering records from Record Collector or buying from Record Fayres check the condition and true value before parting with your money.

IMPORT COLLECTING

In the last issue of Country Club, I looked at the UK Big Country releases. From the response it was evident more people are now searching for imports to add to their collection, hopefully this will be both interesting and helpful. With the current lull in the UK market it would seem a good time to start adding to your existing collection.

The price of imports varies from around £2.50 to £12 for general release records. Promos naturally come a little more expensive. All 7" imports are usually in the same cover as their UK counterparts, though labels vary from country to country. The US and Canada however released 'Fields of Fire' in a poster sleeve, and Canada saw a change in B-side with 'Close As the poster sleeves are identical with these two releases and neither state the B-side only by checking the disc itself can you see the The Canadian label is blue and the US label is black. Another difference. unusual early release, this time from West Germany, is a double A-side single featuring 'Fields of Fire' and 'In a Big Country'. To my knowledge this is the only double A-side to be released worldwide and is worth having for that fact alone. The West German edition of 'Rose' also has a different B-side to the UK version, it has 'Bass Dance'. A similar change of B-side on 'Rose' appears on the US release, here we find 'Prairie Rose' on the flip side.

The most expensive 7" imports are from Japan, they normally sell at £5. The Japanese releases always come with a pull out sleeve backed with the lyrics. Most Japanese singles have slightly different sleeves than the UK version, with lots of writing and inserts. There is, however, a startling difference in the 'Fields of Fire' single. The Japanese single sleeve shows a table with a whisky bottle and some English money and some other things, unusual to say the least!

In 83/84 Big Country 12" imports were in good supply from places like HMV and Virgin. These days they seem to stock just the mini-albums. The German inports of 'Fields of Fire', 'In a Big Country' and 'Chance' are normally the easiest 12" records to find. The 'Wonderland' mini-album was released in four countries: USA, Canada, Holland, and Japan. They all have varied tracks and the logos on the front cover are different. The Japanese copy has a different shade to the cover pic and carries the lyrics to 'Wonderland' on the back. Another interesting release from Japan is the 'Fields of Fire' 12", which features 5 tracks. This record comes in a red 'Crossing' type cover, and has lyrics to all five songs on the back. The French 'Wonderland' 12" is a bit different, in that the title track is coupled with 'In a Big Country' (pure mix). I think the best designed import has to be 'Where the Rose is Sown' from Canada (c/w 'Prairie Rose'); the cover has a huge cut out middle and through it you can see the label of the record which has the picture of a red rose. The B-side has a good picture of the band on the label.

The best promos from abroad appear to be from the States. 'Look Away' and 'One Great Thing' are released in a red and white cover with the words 'Music To Suit Your Every Mood'. I got both of these records from Record Fayres for £5.50 each.

America also releases advance radio samplers, which are a very good addition to your collection. They usually sell for around £10. These records are issued to the DJ's prior to the general release of the album. I bought the 'Steeltown' version, it has two tracks; 'Rose' and 'Eden'. The latest 12" from the States, which I got from HMV is 'One Great Thing' (big bad mix) c/w 'Look Away' (outlaw mix) and 'Song of the South'. The cover has a green/black marble effect with a large 12" ruler design at the top.

I would hardly call myself 'musically advantaged', I barely know the difference between a guitar riff and a drum roll! As the saying goes, 'I don't know much about it,I just know what I like'. I have to admit I don't know the Skids stuff very well, if I'm truthful I could only think of two singles of the top of my head, I didn't dislike them I just didn't go out of my way to hear them. I did see them play at Northants Cricket Club way back when, there wasn't a lot of effort involved, one could slip through the fire exit with great ease, even though it was only about 50p to get in the front door! I don't remember much about the gig, except a lot of leaping around on and off the stage, and when they played 'Into the Valley' I joined in. I'm afraid I am definately not a Richard Jobson fan, so I wasn't all that interested in what else was going on.

I knew this was going to be difficult, then a compact disc arrives... Hmmm.. very prety but the stylus keeps slipping off... Luckily I know someone who has a Hi-Fi shop and he loaned me a player. I was so impressed I now own it!! Very expensive review this!

The album - THE SKIDS - DUNFERMLINE, a collection of the Skids finest moments, (COMDC 10), has been released by Virgin, (Stuart helped with the choice of tracks), on compact disc ONLY. This is, I presume, to satisfy the need of CD player owning Skids fans, so that they may sample the delights of the Skids through todays modern technology.

The opening song 'Into the Valley', was, and remains my favourite track. It still makes me want to leap around like a thing possessed, have a party, go wild, sing, shout, make a fool of myself and generally have a good time! That's review Marlow style... The rest of the album was good, but of course can't come close to the first track where I'm concerned.

'The Saints Are Coming', I'm afraid I didn't actually get through the whole track, Jobson's voice annoyed me beyond belief. He sounded as though he was attempting a Roger Daltrey which didn't quite happen. I didn't like it at all.

'Scared to Dance', I love the intro, by far the best bit of the track. I would have thought that for those days it was a bit 'old fart' but I wouldn't held that against it in anyway.

'Of One Skin', annoying change in tempo, I loved the 'fast bits' (very technical!!) but the rest was an interuption to my enjoyment.

'Masquerade', I LOVE IT, if I were giving points it would only be a fraction behind 'Into the Valley'.

'Iona', very hills and heather! I liked it more each time I heard it, but I couldn't help thinking it would have been 100% better had Stuart sung it.


The rest of the tracks didn't really provoke any comment. The album on the whole is very Skids, and a good example of music from the late seventies. Stuart's presence is evident throughout, his influence, his guitar style and occasionally his voice. 
