

Hi everyone,

In the last issue, we told you that the Band were concentrating their efforts on breaking back into the American market. Well, they've been there, done it and got the T/shirt. A very, very successful trip with a reception for the band nothing short of rapturous with rave reviews across the board. There was, in fact, a somewhat kind of disbelief that the band were actually still together and "in town" most places because it's been so long. In a lot of cases, it had been ten years or even never that the band had last been in town. The band travelled through forty states (plus Toronto and Vancouver) over the three visits covering 16,500 miles on the road on the actual tour. As stated, the tour was a major success and, having re-introduced Big Country to America and commanded a very good radio reaction, the way is well set up for the next record! In conclusion, although sales were disappointing, it was certainly the best record for years by the band and they are certainly in a far, far better position than they were before its release. The concert at The Roxy in West Hollywood merited the following review from the Hollywood Report:-

"The four man Scottish band with their stunning new album "Buffalo Skinners" is more than a comeback - it reclaims territory. The one hundred minute plus performance centred around the new material and was resplendent with surging folk melodies blown up to Cinemascope proportions, full of bubbling guitar lines and thick power chording from Bruce Watson and strong elforts from lead

singer and songwriter Stuart Adamson, bass player Tony Butler and drummer Mark Brzezicki. The uplifted faithful crowded the filoor, bouncing with glee".

"I had the pleasure of checking out Big Country's show last Monday night and I was amazed at how great this band is live!

Power, passion, humour and great songs are what Big Country's all about. After seeing them live, I've got to give kudos to RCA America for their commitment to this incredible band!"

So, what now? Well, the band are writing new material for the next album which they hope to begin recording in April. Never a dull moment with Big Country.

"Buffalo Skinners" has about run its course now so, apart from 5th March in Leverkusen, Nr Cologne in Germany, there are no dates planned for the forseeable future. I realise that you will not get this mag prior to 5th March (it's skiing season and I've just had a glorious time on the piste and am now trying to catch up on the back-log) but, I did "hot news" the German fans about it. Nevertheless, to fill you all in; on 5th March, Big Country are playing at the Culturecenter Forum in Leverkusen as part of the climax of "Rock Open 1994". "Rock Open" was founded in 1993 to focus attention on the variety of rock and pop groups of the local scene of Liverkusen. Groups will appear on different stages spread around the city and the finale of the whole week is the concert at the Culturecenter Forum and besides the international top-act, "Big Country", a nationally well known group" Stoppok" and a local group "Partners In Crime" will be appearing. The event of "Rock Open" is run by the music initiative ARO (Association Rock), the culture department of the city and the sponsor Ganser, a local beer brewery. Anyway, that's about all I can tell you about it at present and I hope that those of you who were able to get there will let me know how the event went.

You will all have been aware of the Hogmanay dates (29th December - Glasgow, Barrowlands, 30th December - Newcastle University and 31st December -Aberdeen, Capitol). The Hogmanay show was an hour and half acoustic, the midnight bells and followed by a full electric set for another hour and half - what a brilliant way to see in New Year! All three dates were recorded for the long awaited live album due for release, hopefully, late this year - as an album and video which was filmed at the Barrowlands gig. I was really, really pissed off at not being able to go to any of these dates and I'm sure there are hundreds of you who feel as disappointed as I do but, well, that's life, and we now wait with baited breath the release.

Caron Hardon from Wigton, Cumbria (003513) wrote in saying, "....Newcastle University gig on 30th December. The journey from Cumbria was well worth it as the boys were truly on form. The acoustic set was wonderful, a real sing-song atmosphere (despite the tone deaf Geordie behind me! The loud guitars were well worth the wait, the crowd bounced, leapt and jumped in time to the songs and really went wild. This had to be my best Christmas present ever. I think I sat in the car and grinned from ear to ear all the way home. What a wally, eh? Thanks to all concerned for a wonderful night."

THE BAND ANSWER YOUR QUESTIONS

Q What were the best three gigs for you, personally, in America? Bruce The Roxy in L.A., The Colliseum in Seattle and Woocky's in Kansas City when we supported Paul Rodgers.

Mark New York, L.A. and Dallas. It's always good to perform well at the major cities as everyone is more on edge to do well with a lot of important people there. Dallas was fab because it was a great sounding theatre.

Tony Seattle Colliseum because it was great to turn my bass up loud in such a big venue and the L.A. Roxy – it was just a brilliant gig.

Stuart My favourite three shows were, in no particular order.- New York: the people there are so used to seeing any band they would like, so it was brilliant for us to be received so enthusiastically. Dallas: (in fact all of the Texas shows). I have never had anything other than a great time in Texas, It's like a separate country. Minneapolis: we played at a venue we had played before but had problems at (we arrivelayed late in the snow) but this time we played great and had a fantastic night.

I should also say, though, that the whole tour was very satisfying both in the way we played and were received.

- Which are your favourite American cities and why?
- Bruce New York City. It always reminds me of "Taxi Driver" or any Woody Allen movie. I find it the most exciting city in the world!
- Mark Boston and L.A. Boston is most like home but still American and L.A. is hot and crazy.
- Tony L.A. I love being there for short periods of time because it's the kind of place that is so unreal that nothing about it should be taken seriously except the sun and earthquakes. BUT, it can get very boring in paradise (exquisitively boring).
- Stuart I don't really have any favourites although I love California and the southern States. I enjoy being in America, generally.

Stuart Not really, although I love Dan's voice and have jammed with them a few times.



Art Lave (Membership No 003858) meets Big Country!

During their successful tour of the States in 1993, I had the opportunity to see Big Country in concert not only once, but twice. I was also lucky enough to meet the band between shows and to spend time with Mark Brzezicki, a master drummer who has been a huge influence on my drumming career. I hope that other club members, especially those who may not have ever seen BC perform live, may find this "unofficial tour report" interesting.

The first show that I went to was in Atlanta, Georgia at The Masquerade on 9th December. After having driven over four hundred miles (not on "Fields Of Fire", though), I hoped that I might he able to meet the band when they arrived but the weather was terrible and, when Big Country got there, they immediately went in to run through a soundcheck. I hung around outside the club for a little while listening to Mark, Tony and Bruce warm up but then I heard the guitar riffs to "Heartbreaker" and "Honky Tonk Women" and knew that had to be Stuart! The rain forced me to leave but I came back that evening and saw one of the most exciting live performances ever. My first time seeing Big Country in concert!

The audience (myself included) went wild when Big Country took the stage, opening with "All Go Together". The guys looked like they were really enjoying themselves and were in great shape as they rolled through most of "The Buffalo Skinners", throwing in older material like "Look Away", "Wonderland", "Lost Patrol" (during which Tony, Stuart and Bruce left the audience through the "yay-yui-yay-o" part of the song) and, of course, "In A Big Country". They also rocked out on a cover of Neil Young's "Hey, Hey, My, My". Stuart even went into the audience a couple of times. I wish that critics who dismiss them as a "bagpipe guitar" band could have seen this amazing hour and forty five minute performance.

Shortly after Big Country's final encore, Mark and Stuart came out to meet some of the fans, signing autographs and chatting with everyone. Even after such a physically exhausting show they took the time to talk to us and I have great respect for BC for doing so. How many bands just deliver barely an adequate performance, then rush off the stage to the bus or limo, sequestering themselves from their fans? Anyway, getting off my soapbox. I finally got a chance to meet Mark, explaining that I play drums and we talked about his return to Big Country and I nervously asked if I could see the band's soundcheck at the next show. He cheerfully said OK and told me where to meet the band!

BC's next performance was in Augusta, Georgia at The New Post Office. BC was headlining a show celebrating the first anniversary of a local alternative



station, Channel Z and, as part of the promotion, they made an appearance at RadioActive Music. I found out about this listening to Channel Z on the drive from Atlanta so I stopped in and saw BC browsing through the shop looking for music to add to their own collections. Once again, several fans had shown up and the guys kind of "hung out". Mark and I talked about his "re-enlistment" in BC and he showed me some recordings by other artists that he has drummed on. (Fans of Mark should really check out "The Prodigal Stranger" by Procol Harum and "Pure" by Midge Ure which also has Mark's brother, Steve, playing bass).

The band then left to do a live interview on Channel Z, during which they performed an acoustic version of "The Long Way Home" and talked about some of the past record company problems that have kept them from touring the States. I think that the Georgia DJ had a little problem keeping up with Stuart's brogue but the interview was fun and several tracks from "The Buffalo Skinners" (or "The Finnalo Skuffers" as Stuart jokingly referred to it were played.

I anxiously awaited the band's soundcheck at the club but nearly missed it when one of the club's staff asked me to leave. Fortunately, Mark spoke up and said, "He's with me!" (Thanks, Mark) I sheepishly followed Mark back to his colossal double-bass set as he made some minor adjustments. He asked what I wanted to hear so I named, "Tall Ships Go", the extended intro to "In A Big Country", "Pink Marshmallow Moon" and "Fields Of Fire". Mark also played "River parts of Of Hope" Remembrance Day", "P.I.O.T." and Rain Dance". I must say that I probably had an awe-struck look on my face as I watched this talented musician easily play syncopations which are difficult at best. The sound of his drum set was incredible. Mark gave me a tour of his set and then we talked about his double-bass technique and other "drummers-only" things. We watched Tony warm up with "Seven Waves" and Stuart singing "Look Away". Mark then joined the guys to run through a moving rendition of "Ships". In a word, AWESOME!

Just as before, BC put on a spectacular show before an audience who seemed to know every song in the set. Several of us waited after the show and I was able to talk to Ian Grant who said that there is going to be a greatest hits package and a video collection released in the US in early 1994. He also mentioned that BC may return to the States in 1994 to tour larger venues with another major act. (Please note that both of these plans now look doubtful but I will, of course, keep vou informed). Then the band came out of their bus and we got to tell them how much we had enioved their performance. I also talked more to Mark which could fill a page or two, like the fact that he did the demos for Sting's "All This Time", and that he was an unofficial member of Go West before BC, etc. Suffice it to say that he is glad to be back and appreciates all the support the fans are giving him and the band, as do Stuart, Bruce and Tony. I left Augusta that night feeling "over the top", having met four of the most consummate musicians and nicest people.

I wish to thank Mark, Bruce, Tony and Stuart for their time and for their kindness and generosity with their fans, Ian Grant and crew for letting me in the soundcheck. We hope we get to see you in the States again SOON.



Harley wrote the following letter with INSTRUCTIONS to me to PRINT IT and, as this is your, the members', club, here's the letter! "In brief response to issue 29's General Letters (though you've never given me a hearing): If Buffalo Skinners is the album the band had always wanted to make, it's valuable. Now, I just hope they don't become complacent or think they've done anything. They can't dwell enough on the chains of oppression and the yoke of injustice because this is truth and if the radios don't like to play it or the public don't want to hear it then tough shit. And forget about the Celtic tinge and folk roots or using folk instruments. People just don't want the band to develop. Gimmicky, undeserving bands like REM use folk as a commercial ploy, it has no relevance now and is as dead as Latin. Electric guitars ARE folk instruments since folk music IS for the people. If you're looking for curious sounds, vou're not looking for folk, you're not listening to the music and so you'd better look elsewhere. Just you print that, OK"? So, Harley, I've given you a hearing.

Obviously, since the US tour, America and Canada are buzzing and panting for more of BC and I've been swamped with mail, following revitalised and/or brand new interest from across the Atlantic. So, remembering the fact that fans over there have been waiting and waiting for the chance to see BC live, you can imagine that they all wanted to share their experience with like-minded people. So, at the risk of, basically, repeating what UK and European fans have been able to experience more frequently, let's hear from across the Pond:-

From Jeff Patterson from Cypress, Ca (Membership No 003868)

".... Roxy Theatre in L.A. on 15th November. What a great show! They played all but two songs from the new album..... Afterwards, we hung around, got to chat with the boys and obtain autographs. It was most excellent! From Stephanie Palermo from Memphis, Tennessee ('cos of past criticisms about being sycophantic, I thought I'd print this):-"....I would most definitely start crying if I thought that you guys were taking this letter as a critique of character rather than a critique of musicianship. In all honesty, I was a bit disappointed by your latest album "Buffalo Skinners". Allow me to explain. Like many of your American fans, no doubt, I was first drawn in by the song "In A Big Country". Because of it, I ran right out and bought the whole album. I even felt it worthy enough to buy on CD later. Upon hearing the rest of the story, as it were, I all but fell in love with you guys. The energy and style of that album came together very effectively and it provided a fresh alternative to the fluffy substanceless musical scene at that time (e.g. Wham and Culture Club etc.) So, when I think of BC, I hear "Harvest Home" and "Porrohman" Now, I'm fully aware of the fact that we all tend to change and move on and perhaps it was that fact which led you to try a newer sound on a new generation. If that's the case, so be it -but I don't have to like it! See, I didn't get enough of "The Crossing" and I suppose I was expecting more of the same from the new album. know you put out other albums but I can't find them and I haven't heard them. I'm looking forward to the day that I find them in an unsuspected record store. Until then, I can only use "The Crossing" as a reference point. And, judging by that album alone, sometimes, just every now and then, you ought to look at who you are and know when that's just perfect by any standards. As I don't know you personally, I'm not trying to sav that you're a waste of oxygen. I am merely expressing a solitary, though critical, opinion of your new album.

I applaud the political agenda of the lyrics but think something is lost in the spirit (or soul) of the music. "Mind you", Graham says, "virtually every BC single got a mention, especially "Alone", "Ships" and "Wonderland".





THE INFALLIBLE(?) CD !?

Indestructable, we were told - yeah, sure!

Anyway, Liam Davey (Membership No 001593) has written to me on this problem which may be of interest (in case you've missed out on this worrying news to record collectors).

The article from the "Daily Mail" dated November 14th states:-

Music-lovers are discovering that thousands of CDs produced in the late Eighties are corroding and becoming unplayable.

All were pressed by the PDO company which produces 25% of CDs on sale in Brilish shops, including the Phonogram, Polydor and Pontana labels. Major shareholder, Philips, inventor of the CD, admits it first noticed the problem in 1989!

Liam writes, "....Like many other fans, I usually buy all formats of a single release but, as everyone is aware, record companies and producers are concentrating on CD as the main format.

When I buy a CD, I view it as everlasting - for life, as it were but, complaints against PDO have surfaced in the Press.

Between 1988 and 1989, thousands of CDs produced are corroding and becoming unplayable, apparently the CDs start turning a gold colour and then rust from the inside causing information to be lost and render the CD unplayable.

All came in cardboard cases so keep an eye on these discs in the future. My own CDs are still playing fine but I must admit that "King Of Emotion" is turning a little golden !
