o, what did you all think of the acoustic dates? Andrew and I were at Dingwalls on Thursday 21st March - WOW, what can one say? It was brilliant (Stuart feeling better than he had the previous evening when, unfortunately, he was not at all well and had to leave the stage several times but, by all accounts, he returned and soldiered on). The Thursday gig was definitely different, refreshing and very, very enjoyable. Oliver and Mike (good to see you both there) give their thoughts about the evening elswhere but the general opinion seems to be MORE of the same, we loved every minute of it and it really gave the impression of a wonderful jam session. The Dingwalls set included seven gueests, who (not to take anything at all away from BC) all added an enormous amount to the evening:

Steve Harley - guest vocalist.

Carol Laula - guest vocalist (also at Northampton and Cambridge)

Kym Mazelle - guest vocalist

Hossam Ramzy and Mohammed - percussion (they were with Page/Plant's band last year)

Aaron Emerson - keyboard (Aaron plays in the band - Buzztonic and is the son of Keith Emerson of Emerson, Lake and Palmer).

Mark played on Buzztonic's album.

Bobby Valentino - fiddle.

There were a hoard of video cameras in evidence and yes a video release is expected which should be bloody great! The acoustic album (working title - "Eclectic") was recorded on 20th/21st March at Dingwalls, Camden Lock. The release date (initially May) is now 12th August and the PROVISIONAL track listing, as at today is:-

Graham Goodall (001511) sent a piece from the London Evening Standard dated 22nd September 1995 which stated, ".... have it on the best authority that the Rolling Stones will tour again next year, having only just finished emptying the world's piggy banks. Apparently, Mick Jagger enjoyed it so much that he wants to do it again and word is that Big Country will be the support act, having built up a terrific rapport with the headliners on the later dates of the Voodoo Lounge marathon...." This was obviously spotted by loads of you and so, to all of you who have written asking whether this is true or false - Yeah, this was true BUT the Stones then decided not to go on the road afterall so, that was the end of that.

Mention and hopes of a USA tour. We did hope for a tour of the east coast and mid west states about now (April/May 1996) but, unfortunately, with little radio support promised at the moment it has been decided to put this on hold for the time being. Sorry America! I did hear about a "bring BC to America campaign!" This was, or maybe still is, the plan of some wonderful fans in the States to hold an American Big Country Convention. If they are able to get this started then I wish them every bit of luck but any problems encountered with holding a Convention here in the UK were enough so, obviously, putting such an event on in America would multiply all hurdles by 1,000 fold. I feel certain that, should such plans get anywhere then, those involved will let me know and I will pass on any developments 'cos you never know.

Japanese tour - we are still hopeful that this will occur later this year but we'll have to wait and see. "Why The Long Face" due for release out there in June.

I would like to take this opportunity to say how sorry I was to receive a letter from Kent Humphreys and our thoughts and heart-felt sympathy go the family and friends of Darryl Williams. Kent, who was a good friend of Darryl's. wrote, "There are quite a few fans in Wrexham who travel to as many Big Country concerts as we can and meet up at the gig. One of the fans was Darryl Williams who travelled to most gigs with his brother, sister-in-law and some friends. Distance was no object and they travelled all over the country. Sadly, Darryl died suddenly on 26th December 1995 of meningitis. They played "One In A Million" at his funeral which was a fitting tribute. He was a good friend and an ardent fan who will be greatly missed by all who knew him". Kent, please pass on our condolences.

# WHAT'S GOING ON - 1996?

Stuart appeared at the Midem, Asia in Hong Kong recently (week of 13th May). He performed his set, Carol Laula her set and then they did a set together which apparently went really well, the highlight being "Take Me To The Moon". Stuart and Carol will be making a "Celtic" album together later this year.

As mentioned, Stuart is making a solo album and was recently in Nashville with Randy Scruggs getting this together (Randy Scruggs is a well known country performer). Expected to be more a male K D Laing rather than Lyle Lovett type album). Hopeful for an autumn release.

A short tour is being scheduled for late August (dates/venues to be advised) but you can expect to catch the band: 27th July in Luton, 13th July in Northampton, 3rd August in Pentrich, Derbyshire, Guildford and Plymouth. There will possibly be ten UK gigs. Keep in touch with the hot line and/or hot news for details to be announced shortly.

"Project X". Can't tell you much about this except that this is the working title for an album of Bruce, Tony and Mark plus a Steve Tyler type, a gravel-throated 24 years old Glaswegian vocalist. Watch this space - when I know more, I'll let you know!!

Then we have Tony's project. Tony has recorded a song for M.E. Awareness on behalf of the charity "Action for M.E.". The song, apparently, is a tear-jerker written by Tony as a result of "Action for M.E.'s Help and Guidance". He has, unfortunately, seen the effects of this debilitating condition and this song is to help with their campaign that will be running throughout the year. When released, the record will include two other tracks plus a piano instrumental version of the main track entitled "One Day To The Next" featuring Mark

Brzezicki on drums and backing vocals, Josh Philips on keyboards, Al Hodge guitar and the children's choir from Tony's local primary school. This is not a "cause celeb" but a lot of people out there do not understand what M.E. is and the song is about what it's like to have it from a child's point of view and how difficult it is for us well people to understand it. Obviously, I will keep you informed of Tony's progress with this.

If, like me, you are one of those who don't know much about ME then:

"ME is an abbreviation of "Myalgic Encephalomyelitis" (also known as postviral fatigue syndrome or chronic fatigue syndrome) - a debilitating condition which is still not universally accepted as a genuine disease. As suggested, this can occur following a viral infection leaving the sufferer with a range of symptons which can recur for years. There is no treatment for ME but, with time, the symptons do diminish."

Tony is also producing a couple of local bands - no peace, eh?!

As stated before - just because the band members are persuing a variety of seperate projects at the moment this is **NOT THE END of Big**Country - they will be back in the studio working on their next studio album with a view to a 1997 release.

Don't forget, the acoustic album, "Restless Natives" and, of course, the obscurities album!!!



Oliver Hunter (000490) wrote to me with his views on the Dingwalls gig

"What a fantastic gig!!! What can I say? Last night was a spectacular extravaganza of performances. It was nothing like The Roadmender gig (and I daresay the Cambridge and the first night at Dingwalls). The first thing to mention is that, not only was the show recorded for a live CD but also filmed. There was an editing studio truck outside into which most of the cameras fed. There were also several other cameras not connected into this setup - a guy with a cine camera, several camcorders and a few press photographers. All this combined with the smallest stage I have seen BC perform on.

BC played a similar set to the other gigs with a few changes and several guests joined them. Bobby Valentino - 'electric' violin played on several songs, Kym Mazelle, Steve Harley played guitar and sang on two songs as well and Carol Laula joined in on some tracks plus Aaron Emerson on keyboard and Hossam and Mohammed on percussion.

### Big Country at Glasgow Barrowlands

### 7th October 1995

Thirteen years from their conception, Big Country no longer have the sales success they once enjoyed but their records and, more importantly, live shows show they are still a force to be reckoned with.

Their gigs are still (if not even more so) met with the frantic ferour of a decade ago and the Barrowlands heaved with 2,000 fanatical Scots as Stuart, Bruce, Tony and Mark rocked Glasgow with a ballbusting performance.

Prior to that, Simon Townsend (brother of Pete) had tried enthusiastically, albeit unsuccessfully, to entertain the people who were there for one reason alone - the fact he was a lone figure with a tuneless guitar certainly didn't help his cause and the crowd's obvious restlessness was reflected by the occasional projectile and chanting of various BC favourites. (I thought he did well - I. Grant!)

The crowd's mood was soon transformed however into a passionate heaving mass of BC worshippers as the first chords of "God's Great Mistake" rang out. Grinning broadly as if they'd just won the lottery the lads proceeded to stir their ardent gathering into a frenzy, teased the crowd with an unheard-of riff before launching into the "Team Spirit" section of "GGM", then raising the roof with a dynamite-injected finish - and this was just the first song!

Half a gasp of air later it's the last single, "You Dreamer", classic BC followed by the old favourite "Look Away"

By this point we were breathing heat not air and after a brief pause from Stuart to say "Hi", the voyage continued with the anthemic "Ships" and an extralong "Sail Into Nothing" before being hit by "Thunder And Lightning".

Big Country were on top form, clearly enjoying themselves and the crowd's irrepressible energy was never ending as the first ever live performance of "Eiledon" (from the 1986 LP "The Seer") was unleashed prior to acoustic renditions of "The Storm" and the new Greenpeace benefiting "Post Nuclear Talking Blues".

Over the years BC have made many great songs, many of which were missing from the set - "IABC", "Steeltown", "Lost Patrol", "13 Valleys", "Chance", "Harvest Home" to name just a few (classic) favourites but live almost any song is bound to go down well with the devoted faithful and the set still contained an abundance of superb songs -"Inwards", "Wonderland", "Alone", "PIOT", "I'm Not Ashamed" and the rousing "We're Not In Kansas" prior to the encores.

Big Country aren't getting any younger but their spirit and drive is showing no sign of decline and this is a testament to their intense desire to make music - this fact is obviously not lost on their fans as the audience reaction to every song, chord and emotion is full of fanatical responses.

Thirteen years on, things are much the same - the checked shirts have long gone but Stuart still plays to the crowd, swings his guitar and kicks the air ferociously and the crowd love it - they love the music, the passion, the energy, the release they get. So what if other bands have done it before and others will do it in vears to come - Big Country do it best and to all the fuckwits who say this is boring and old hat needn't bother to go and see Big Country. But if you like energy and enthusiasm from crowd and band alike go and see Big Country - you'll love 'em"

The gig drew to a close with "Restless Natives" (from possibly the funniest film of the 80s), a Gulf-Stormin'-Norman "Fields of Fire" and a rousing "Hey Hey, My My" and then it was all over.

When the news of the cancelled tour broke on the BC list, posts came pouring in like a flood of despair. There were deeply intellectual remarks like "Fuck!", beautifully-expressed, thought-provoking lines like, "I can't believe it... what the hell?" "What's going on here?" and even eloquent pleas for reconsideration like, "I'm on the roof of my building and if they don't come I'm gonna jump!" Haven't seen any postings from that person in a while. Hmmm....

Now, these reactions may seem a bit over-dramatised to many of you. If so, you're probably one of those lucky rat bastards across the sea who get to see the band numerous times on every tour while we poor, wretched colonials have to live vicariously through you, reading your glowing accounts of fantastic performances, obscure classics being played for the first time ever.

BC, if presented properly, would be such a breath of fresh air! Hell, they'd be a tornado of fresh air! And let's not forget VH1, which, to many baby boomers is the epitome of your social life! What I'm saying is ... ah, if you've gotten this far through this drek, you know what I'm saying.

So, months after a largely ignored album has been released, with no real catalogue in circulation at the local record stores in which interest may be raised, with no measurable level of public awareness of the band, and with the outrageous costs that a tour entails, what's the point of touring? The band would probably lose money and would not reap any real benefits in the way of promotion etc. So guys, as disappointed as we all are I think we do understand.

What I don't understand, though, is why WTLF was released over here at all. It just doesn't make sense and the current state of things would seem to guarantee that all current copies of the album will be nestled comfortably in their respective bins until Doomsday. Or at least 'til Bono takes off those fly glasses, whichever comes first. Obviously, no one planned for things to work out this way (I hope) but I for one would like to know what some of the original marketing strategies in the US were. I mean, we're all family here. Why not divulge? Were there ever plans for a US-released video? Were there ever plans for a properly-released single? If so, what happened? If not, why? In the meantime, perhaps the band might consider the opening slot on the up-coming Kiss reunion. I mean, they did open for Alice Cooper once, right? Why not take it to the next level? Maybe Gene Simmons could teach Stu how to breathe fire and spit blood during "Chance" or something.

You know, we die-hards may appear overly-critical at times but it's just because we know how great this band is, we know how wonderfully unique they are, we know how much their music has meant to our lives and we don't ever want it to end. More than that, we want others to experience the same things we have. We want the band to be as successful as they can possible be because we love their music immeasurably and we want more of it. Is that so wrong?

However, we must always remember that this larger-than-life music is created by four normal human beings, with problems and concerns of their own. Contrary to what my twisted tune implies, the band really owes us nothing more than what they've already given us and we must always resist the temptation to think that just because we buy the product, we also buy some stock in the artists' lives. Not that it wouldn't be a good investment, though. Hmmm, "BC futures" .... maybe I'll talk to my broker.

OK, I'm running out of space here so, let me conclude on a personal note concerning the remasters. The first one I set spinning was my all-time favourite. My first love. STEELTOWN. As Tony's frenetic bass line launched the righteous anger of "Flame Of The West", and the dueling guitars merged in seamless frenzy, I began to read Stuart's words,

"The music on this record grew out of those people. The alienated, the dispossessed, the exploited, the abused.."

And the slate was wiped clean. The invisible counter which had kept track of the hundreds of time I had listened to the album reset to zero. THIS was my first time, all over again. It was like having a treasured loved one whom you've known for years and have come to take for granted. It was like looking into her eyes and realising what made you fall so helplessly and hopelessly for her in the first place. Realising you could never live without her.

That's when I dropped to my knees, pulled out the ring, and said, "Steeltown, will you marry me?" You didn't think I would end with that mush, did you? Till next time......
