Buffalo Skinners, I think, was one of the best albums we've made and WTLF was just as good but there was total unawareness of their existence." says Tony and I asked him about the fact that answers in a recent interview appeared in the 'past' tense when talking about Big Country, "Yes, that was unfortunate but the questions were all rhetoric and when answering you don't always stop to think about the tense you are using. Big Country are NOT finished".

# News, News, News

**Tony:** is keeping himself extremely busy and has several projects underway, with which he is very excited. There will be much more news later in the year but, in a nut shell:

"Great Western Records" Tony's newly formed record label. Primarily this has been formed with new, local bands in mind. For only two or three years now there has been available a method of recording on to computer as opposed to tape "Hard disc recording" which is far cheaper than conventional methods and therefore makes the whole concept of recording far more economically viable for new bands who are trying to break into the music industry. The sound is, apparently, very good and this is the method by which Tony has recorded his solo album. The launch of "Great Western Records" is planned for later this year. More news as it comes in.

As mentioned, apart from working with and producing local bands Tony has a collection of songs which he has written over the last ten years and has made an album entitled "Black And White" - before you all start trying to get this album it is NOT RELEASED YET, the release is expected to be late summer. On the launch of the record label and release of the album there could well be some gigs from Tony and his band (Mark features on drums on a couple of the tracks but otherwise it's Tony with local musicians). These projects have been totally Tony Butler and he has not, nor will he be using any BC contacts when it comes to distribution, management, agents etc. etc. "I've wanted to do this for years and this is my chance, if BC were to keep going without a break I just wouldn't have the time to see this through".

Then, of course, there was and still is the ME Awareness single "One Day To The Next". This is planned for release in 1998 to coincide with ME Awareness Week in March or May 1998 (not 1997) and will be available via the charity. That's a long way off yet so, nearer the time I'm sure to be able to tell you more. **Stuart:** As I type this, Stuart has written fifteen songs and is back in Nashville for his fourth visit continuing work on the album. Nashville is a very close knit musical community and, in order to crack through this, he has been co-writing with country musician which, to date, include Vince Melamed, Marcus Hummon and Bruce Sudano. I promise that as soon as I know anything about release I will let you know but no matter how many times I'm asked the question, we don't know yet. As mentioned previously, Stuart wants to finish this project before working with Carol Laula so this, as yet, has not happened.

**Bruce:** I mentioned in the previous issue that Bruce was going to be working with Fish and also on an Alex Harvey Tribute album. Well, I spoke to Bruce yesterday (Thursday 27th February) and neither of these projects have actually come off.

Bruce is also busy - no sitting on his arse. He and Sandra have recently moved house and Bruce is busy with the DIY bits as, apparently, the house needs renovation and, having only just finished our house I know exactly what they are going through with the chaos that is unavoidable.

BUT, the painting and papering has to be fitted in with his obligations to his new, "wee" band (Bruce's brother on drums). The band is, as yet, unnamed but he did throw a few ideas at me yesterday, one of which was "Wild Blue Yonder" - yeah, sounds OK to me. The music, apparently, is fairly up-tempo and, like Tony, Bruce sees this as an outlet for the songs he has written over the years which were not used and there is a chance of a live recording which, if it happens, will be sold by themselves and probably available through mail order. In fact, it's a little back to basics 'cos when we had finished talking Bruce was off to make a pedal board - he has to play "roadie" now and set up his own gear etc. The gigs are to be acoustic - the first of which was a warmup on Thursday 27th February to be closely followed on Sunday 2nd March, both at a pub in Dunfermline - "Sinkys" - they have a set list of about 13/14 songs of which half will be original and the other half covers.

Chance of a tour? - Yeah, could well be. I'll pass on any info I get on this.

**Mark:** Mark is busy to say the least but the problem is that he is doing so much that everything is all very open at the moment and until one of the many projects really breaks through it's difficult for him to tell me what he's doing and even more difficult for me to pass on the details.

In the last magazine Oliver Hunter raised the question of a CD entitled "Long Way Home" which includes "All Go Together", "Long Way Home". "Where The Rose Is "Alone", Thorn" (?!?), "Steeltown", "Ships", "We're Not In Kansas", "IABC", "F of F", "Hey Hey My My" and "Long Way Home" (acoustic). No one seemed to know anything about this but, since then I've received a response from Karl Proese (004129) who tells us that this is a bootleg which was recorded in Germany during the Buffalo Skinners Tour. Also, Karl says

that there is another bootleg entitled "Where Did The Feeling Go?". This includes songs from the WTLF tour and was recorded in Karlsruhe. Cheers, Karl.

Peter Hornberg (000046) also wrote to me on this subject saying the bootleg tape was recorded at Balingen, Germany.

And then, Andreas Schade (004191) wrote saying, "..... bootleg CD from the concert in Balingen, Germany at the SWF 3 Open Air 9th July 1994. I actually was at that gig (where also Gotthard and Bob Dylan played). BC played around ninety minutes and before the concert they gave an interview. During that interview they played two songs unplugged: "IABC" and "Long Way Home". The concert was broadcast on German TV (I have that record) and on the radio (of course I have that, too). The songs which are not on the "LWH" CD are "Wonderland", "Look Away" and "Chance". The first two songs are included on the video (also the interview with the unplugged songs) and "Chance" was played on the radio. So, I own the complete show ...... Before and after the concert the audience were interviewed ......the audience interviews are also on the video. The "IABC" unplugged and the live version were mixed up in the video so you have the beginning of the unplugged song and end of the Unfortunately, live song. Stuart's superb guitar solo is missing in that song. 1994 was the year of the football world cup and during one song a football was thrown on the stage. Bruce gave it back to the audience with an enormous kick and Stuart interrupted his singing shortly to comment on Bruce's football qualities. It was a very nice afternoon and Stuart had also a lot of fun with the audience by make some jokes."

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# Letters, thoughts and experiences

I've received a couple of e-mails and, for anyone who has access but hasn't been there yet, it appears that Stuart and Kirsten have popped into the Big Country chat room from time to time at John Underwood's web site "The Crossing". 'Chatters' were a bit sceptical at first about whether it was truly Stuart but, why shouldn't it be?? Anyway, thanks go to Michael for sending the transcript through but I will not reproduce the dialogue here because, as you stated in your e-mail "I guess you just had to be there" but it sounds like fun.

Michael says, "... a few words about the chat room environment. It's generally a place of R&R where fans unwind and get to know one another, so a sense of relaxed informality is the norm. Also, unlike the list, subscription is not a prerequisite for entry so anyone and everyone can drop in, and often do.

Recurring visitors have included gen-u-ine country music fans (who as a rule are polite but bemused) as well as net surfers who haven't a clue as to where they are except that it looks like it might be a fun place to chat. All are welcomed, as to do anything else would be a discourtesy to them and a disservice to BC.

As might be expected in such an open forum, there have also been those visitors who evidently derive enjoyment from being abusive or vulgar. (Simply ignoring them is the most effective counter-irritant).

And there are the charlatans. "GOD" has been there, and one of the most entertaining chats in my experience was with "Death", who stayed firmly in character for the entire conversation.

It's also perhaps relevant to note that at the time "The Adamson Chats" occurred the room had been a going concern for nine full months without a single "official" visitation - to some fans (such as myself) the likelihood of one ever occurring seemed remote indeed.

But, most importantly, and please keep this in mind, the chat room is a fun place and often a silly place.

So, why this "disclaimer"?

Because, for all the above reasons, it was not easy to give instant and/or full credence to "Stuart's" claim of identity, which accounts for the oftimes irreverent tone of the chat. Even so, did "Stuart" feel welcome? I think it's a telling point that "Kirsten" stayed in the room after he left and, more importantly, returned the next day.

Also if you have never been there the repetition of crashes and entrances and even text is quite common. Also normal is the often inverted or delayed conversational flow. "A" will say something to "B" and the very next post on the screen is from "B" but it totally ignores what "A" just said. "B" has not yet seen "A"'s post and may not catch up for several minutes. Also, there's generally more than one conversation going on at the same time. Keep that in mind too, as that's the way it goes."

Anyway, reading the transcript it all looks quite good fun if you have the time, access and money to pay for the time on-line. Pay a visit why don't you and you could be "in the same room as Stuart" for a while. (Stuart was there on 14th October at 9.55am EDT)

**Phillip Bendall** says, "I was put on hold for a long time the other day when I called a government agency. They played taped music to me down the line, a mixed tape of songs a few years old .... and I just about dropped the phone when "King of Emotion" came on! Now that's my kinda Muzak!"

Martin Hetherington (004090), (I wait to hear from you, Martin, as to whether you are happy that I print your address! - Jan) To my knowledge any sheet music which has, in the past, been available is now out of print. So, you could be of help to lots of fans. - Jan

Martin has noticed several requests in past mags for guitar chords. So, he says "I have quite a lot of material, both bought and worked out myself which I use for my home use. I would be guite happy to supply this material to other members and also maybe transcribe other BC songs. Martin says there are many techniques for transcribing songs with the most basic of set ups. My way is supplied if you would like to publish it. You will need the following equipment:-

1) CD player. Though cassette or record player is OK they do not have the same quality as a CD player and you don't get the same sort of control over the track for pausing and rewinding. You're also less likely to damage your favourite song. Variable equaliser controls are quite handy, though this doesn't have to be 25 band (1 only have 5).

2) Stereo headphones. Though mono ones are OK it is easier to listen to one side of the mix. Some Big Country songs have Bruce's guitar on one side and Stuart's on the other. If each headphone speaker has adjustable volume this is even better because you may want to listen to the whole of the mix but with one side louder than the other.

3) A tab manuscript book. These can be bought in music shops. If a tab manuscript is not available, normal musical stave manuscripts are OK (I used to use them), though there's only five strings available so the first string (low E) can be tabbed on an imaginary line. If a PC is available this is better. Use a text editor and create your own tab lines or pick up tab utilities from the Internet. (http://www.OLGA.net/).

4) Patience. Sometimes a piece will get on your nerves. Keep plugging away, take a break and come back to it later.

#### Before you start to transcribe think about people in your house and the neighbours.

I annoyed everybody where I lived trying to learn Fields Of Fire with my guitar amp full welly. They are more impressed when you can play it, so don't let them hear it till you can.

Make sure you are comfortable. Sit down and have everything within arms reach

Tune your guitar to the CD. I'm not aware of any BC songs using non-standard tunings, so electronic tuners should be OK with normal setting.

#### I tend to make myself familiar with the song before I try to learn it

This may mean having it on constantly in the car going to and from work, or it is maybe a favourite of mine that I have finally got around to learning. I can't learn a song straight away after opening the CD for the first time. You need to have the song somewhere in your head to refer to.

Using your EQ, if you have one, eliminate the bass drum, bass guitar and other low frequencies by running down the low button(s). Eliminate the highs by turning down the high button(s). This will take out some of the vocals and cymbals/hi-hat. Turn the mid button(s) up and experiment with your headphone volumes. This should hopefully make the guitar louder than everything else but the emphasis must be on playing around until you get the best volumes for the guitar parts you want to learn. I think there is a device called a Guitar Monitor, which sells at about £70 which can be used to cancel out the vocals and bass completely. I have only read about this so I don't know whether or not it's possible. If it is, get one and call me so I can get one.

I tend not to duplicate what Bruce or Stuart play, as they are expressing themselves their way. I get it close and then do my own bits, whatever comes out. This just adds to the feeling you get when listening to Big Country songs."

Well, I hope you lot understood all of that 'cos I'm buggered if I did! -Jan

### "Never Out Of Place At A Big Country Gig" by Jean Hayton

My son, Simon, (aged 18) is a member of Country Club and we have travelled

all over the place to gigs over the past few years and I have to say that each time it has always been well worth the distance.

I just want to say that, whatever your age you are never out of place at a BC gig. On Saturday 3rd July 1996 we travelled to a field in the middle of nowhere in Pentrich, Derbyshire to the Bikers Festival as we had learnt that BC would be topping the bill. It was an absolutely brilliant evening. After crossing "Fields of Bikes and Tents", we managed to get quite near the front and the sound was excellent, atmosphere electric, the crowd lively

and knee deep in beer cans - we drove home at 3.30am totally exhausted but ecstatic.

In total contrast, our next excursion was to Ronni Scott's Club in Birmingham on Thursday 5th September. After frantic phone calls to the Club I managed to acquire the last couple of tickets available. A hectic dash down the M6 after work and we arrived just in time and were given a tiny table practically on the stage at the side near the fire exit. What an absolutely superb night we had. The audience were all seated, sipping cocktails! Luckily many true BC fans were at the front. This has got to go down as one of my favourite gigs of all time, apart from a unique night at the Boardwalk in Manchester several years ago.

Ronni Scott's was an unusual choice for a BC gig, but the sound, atmosphere, choice of songs, excellent guests, the band's good humour - especially Stuart's - all combined to make a truly memorable evening. I'd love to see more gigs like this, probably because I'm getting too old to stand up all night! Don't you believe it - I couldn't stay seated at a BC gig to save my life - despite numerous request from son and husband to "act my age!"
