NEWS, RUMOURS AND GOSSIP FROM THE DAMASCUS NEWS DESK

Welcome to the news. The past two months have been highly eventful in the life of Big Country, and in this Bulletin we hope to update you with rumours and gossip in what has happened or is alleged to have happened and also a few things that should, might or may happen in the future. Stuart Adamson appeared on BBC2's Never Mind The Buzzcocks on Friday 1st October, and proved to be a hit! A solid performance was put in, where he didn't get the p*ss ripped out of him (as is common on this show), and Stuart came out with many guips, and was captured on camera a lot with wry grins reflecting the banter than was flying about the show. One of Stuart's team-mates was Gail Porter and she came in for a lot of flak from presenter Lamaar, to the extent that he told her that she would not be awarded any more points until she took her top off. She never did, and despite Stuart's star performance, where he got all the songs in the "Guess the Intro" round among others, the opposing team were awarded 4 points per correct answer in the final round (as opposed to the normal one). Both Gail Porter and Marianne Faithful (who was on the opposing team) were firing daggers at Lamaar by the end, and apparently scenes were cut from the recording (2 hours edited to 1/2 hour) where Ms Porter was in tears from Lamaar's jibes, and Mr Adamson comforted her with a re-assuring hug, to the extent Stuart is now Gail Porters new best friend. Marianne Faithful even told Lamaar a few times that "Stuart knows!" the answer to questions she was asked, unfortunately he was on the opposing side, and clearly didn't understand the rules, or didn't care! Fragile Thing was on the Radio 2 play list for a total of 9 weeks (7 weeks A List, 2 weeks B List). See You has just been added to the Radio 2 C List, and it is hoped over the next week or two it shall rise to the A List (20-25 plays per week), while the Fragile Thing video was shown extensively on VH1. CD2 of See You/Perfect World has a very moving startling picture of Bruce and Stuart standing on rubble either side of a Kosovan orphan playing Bruce's mandolin, against a backdrop of war tom, destroyed buildings in Kosovo. Perfect World shall hopefully be seen on the following TV shows (either performance or video): London Today, GMTV, TFI (we are trying - all fans e-mail TFI and ask for BC), among others. Perfect World and/or See You has been added to Clyde, Forth and Radio2 play lists, and we hope Virgin Radio and many others shall pick it up as well. Call/e-mail your local radio stations and ask them to play the songs. Discussions are under way for a Japanese Tour in 2000, as well as a possible USA Tour with Simple Minds. All being well, BC should play a multitude of countries in the year 2000 all around the world. Discussions are also underway for a European Record Deal, which should see the album released throughout Europe next year. Similarly, the USA should see the new album released, possibly to coincide with the USA Tour (provisionally April/May 2000). Big Country shall hopefully be appearing at the opening of a new HMV store in Birmingham on 28th October, and possibly doing other in-store signings the week commencing 25/10/99. BC have taken out Co-op Ads with the likes of HMV, Virgin, Our Price for the week of the Dble A-side Single release, and this shall see the band getting more prominence both newspaper-wise and in-store, thus ensuring a good chance of these chains being well stocked with the single. Stuart was to appear at NetAid introducing Stereophonics & Holly Johnson, but his appearance at NetAid was

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Stuart shall appear on the Popped In Crashed Out ITV Quiz Show, which shall be screened at 00.30am on Saturday 23rd October. Presented by Phil Alexander (Kerrang Editor), it also features Jacques Lucont (from the band Les Rhythmes Digitales). The winner of the show shall have their video shown, so make sure you tune in to see if Stuart wins! If you're quick, you'll be able to pick up a very limited edition of the CD (5000 have been pressed) with two extra tracks, 'Shattered Cross' and 'Too Many Ghosts'. These are from Stuart's other project, Blue Heeler. The band appeared at Key 103 Mardi Gras in Manchester on 29th August, and City Radio's "Liverpool Party At The Pier" the following day, performing a couple of tracks at each event, both events being broadcast live on the radio. Stuart has been doing radio interviews this week (w/c 11/10/99) for future broadcasting. These include ScotFM, BBC Radio Scotland, Clyde2 and Central FM. Check with them for actual broadcast dates and times. Also Stuart did an interview with "The Source" which is syndicated around the country to various Radio Stations - check with your local Radio Stations as to whether they are broadcasting this interview. Stuart has also been doing interviews with the following: ITV Teletext; Bristol Observer; Newcastle Journal; Wolverhampton Express and Star; News of Wolverhampton; Bristol Evening Post; Manchester Evening News; Rochdale Observer. We do not have publication dates of these interviews as yet.

STOP PRESS: VH1 shall be showing Perfect World video on the Paul King show.

FRAGILE THING: CD2: BANNED

Obviously something went down. It's a BIG story, long and quite convoluted. I don't expect any of you to completely get it because I don't.

CIN monitor the charts on behalf of BPI and Milward Brown who publish the charts. As you know there are 3 formats permissible for the singles charts. They're various rules. No more than 20 minutes. Only 3 songs and the A side has to be on both. You can include postcards and posters but you must not have more than a single fold sleeve. I got an email on the Monday night after FT was released, from Pinnacle stating that CIN would not be including CD 2 sales in their chart computations. Why" Too many folds. I was astounded. The team when told was astonished. Too many folds? What's the problem with them and why the ruling. "You mustn't try to get the buyer into buying if the package can be used for something else or a major part in influencing them to purchase. "Rules are rules you know". "Ricky Martin had 1 second over 20 minutes on his CD but we allowed that because no-one would be persuaded to buy that because it had a extra second" I couldn't believe what I was hearing. How come you can give away posters and postcards yet they are not perceived as an enticement? If rules are rules, why wasn't Ricky Martins single banned? Well, there is an organisation called CSC (Chart Supervision

Committee) and they are made up of 6 people from industry. Paul Burger is one of them and guess what, he is also chairman of Sony and Ricky is on Columbia, owned by Sony. 5ive have been making a fuss themselves this week about this problem because they would have been no 1 if Ricky M's single was not on chart. Ludicrous eh! We considered cutting out the offending cardboard bits, even those were in shops. Why were we told on the Monday of the release? Why not the week preceding release (after all they had the singles!). We could have changed them. Why the stupid rule in the first place? Why not be considerate to a new label and warn about next time? If the stores under-ordering and some not taking any with the re-orders not getting instore quickly enough was not bad enough, the stores (well HMV in particular) withdrew both copies of the CD by mistake. We were on course for Top 40. All stores I spoke and went to (20+) have said the singles "flew out". Sorry for this story. It all sounds far fetched. It's insane that they would not include the sale because of the cardboard folds.

Track Records Press Release 12th August 1999

BIG COUNTRY DENIED HIT SINGLE BY LUDICROUS CIN CHART RULES

Big Country, who were set to storm back into the Top 40 single charts with "Fragile Thing" (featuring Eddi Reader), released on Monday 9th August, have had to withdraw the CD2 version from the stores as CIN have ruled that it has "one cardboard fold too many".

The CIN chart committee has ruled that the "jack-in-a-box" origami style lid of the CD2 format of "Fragile Thing" may entice the public to purchase the single for more than just the music. "After Ricky Martin was allowed to break the rules when his single was found to be one second too long this is ludicrous" storms frontman Stuart Adamson. The massive campaign for the single organised by the band's label, Track Records, has included massive support on the Radio Two play list, a full scale national newspaper and regional radio advertising campaign, rave reviews in the national press, a video on the VH1 play list and a punishing promotional schedule. Big Country performed live on BBC1's "Wicked Women" show in Hyde Park on 24th July with Kele Le Roc duetting on "Fragile Thing" alongside Ronan Keating, Emma Bunton, Martine McCutcheon (in whose band guitarist Bruce Watson also guested on the night), Lisa Stansfield and Republica. Last month they played a sold out show at London's Shepherds Bush Empire and at the special request of Jacques Villeneuve appeared at his Lucky Strike Formula 1

party. They were special guests at Rod Stewart's Hampden Park gig in Glasgow and jetted off to Nashville to film the video for the single.

On Monday this week, after CIN's ruling, retailers were asked to withdraw the CD2 cardboard version from their shelves, so that Track could cut the offending extra fold off the sleeve. Many confused retailers withdrew both the CIN approved and the "illegal" version. All of the momentum the record label had achieved was immediately scuppered.

"It's like a 'district town council' or 'planning department' response. Pure, rule book 'red tape'. Is this how the 'business of music' should be run?" railed Stuart Adamson today.

The bands record company was forced to withdraw a version of the new single, Fragile Thing, from the shops after bosses at chart compiler CIN said the packaging "had one cardboard fold too many".

Big Country's comeback single - which also features Eddi Reader of Fairground Attraction fame - was released last Monday. The Scottish Rockers were confident of a top 40 hit for more than eight years. But their hopes were dashed when CIN ruled that the CD's"Jack-in-the-box" style cover broke chart rules.

Big Country spokesman Ian Grant stormed, It's straight out of Monty Python. It's pure red tape, it this how the music business should be run?"

BIG COUNTRY LIVE: PERTH 25TH JULY 1999

However, having broken all land speed records to get there on time we missed the start - bloomin' rubberneckers and Sunday drivers! When we eventually arrived my initial though was how diverse the crowd was - anyone from babies in pushchairs to seriously ageing rockers! The band were playing Fragile Thing when we got there and it really seemed to go down well - excellent! BIG COUNTRY IN KOSOVO

PRISTINA, Serbia (Reuters) - Kosovo swapped combat boots for ballet shoes at the weekend as thousands of residents of the strife-torn province attended a festival of dance, drama and music.

"We're all getting together, like everywhere where life's normal," British actress Vanessa Redgrave, one of the organisers of the festival called "The Return," told Reuters during a jazz and rock concert Saturday night. Redgrave was the spokesworman for the festival, which began Friday night with a concert in Skopje, capital of the neighbouring country of Macedonia, and continued Saturday and Sunday in Kosovo.

The three-day event had sponsorship from artists and performers from all spheres of the entertainment and arts world, including pop singers Elton John, Sting and Bono, classical singer Dawn Upshaw, and dancer Mikhail Baryshnikov. Also involved were numerous foundations and many of the international or national aid agencies involved in

the U.N.-led effort to restore normalcy to Kosovo after Nato's bombing campaign against Yugoslavia.

Ethnic Albanian playwright and actor Enver Petrovci, a portion of whose play "The Cursed" was performed Saturday, said he thought the festival would provide a big boost to restoring some semblance of normalcy to the arts in Kosovo. "It is wonderful that the international artistic community did not forget about Kosovo and they have brought a bit of joy here after 10 years of slavery," he said.

Other performers included a troupe from the Martha Graham Dance Company of New York, French rock singer Patricia Kass, Italian rock star Andrea Mingardi, British stars Lulu and Big Country, Canadian performers Bruce Cockburn and Tribe of One and a miners' choir from Cape Breton called Men of the Deeps. But all the programs also included some ethnic Albanian performers, which Redgrave said was by design. "Albanian culture can do a lot for us too, you know. It's a very beautiful, very wonderful and very vast culture," she said.

Sunday Mail, 19th September 1999: ROCKIN' IN THE RUBBLE

If they make records for the next 20 years, Scots rock star Big Country will NEVER play a more bizarre concert. Singer Stuart Adamson and his group are the toast of Kosovo.. After a gig in war-torn Pristina. But they'll never forget the night they performed in dilapidated sports hall-right next to a bombsite. They were invited to headline The Return Festival - a free concert Stuart, guitarist Bruce Watson and bass player Tony Butler were escorted over the border from Macedonia in a UN troop military convoy. The concert came three months after they starred in the Sunday Mail's charity gig at the SECC FOR Kosovan refugees.

The latest event was organised by actress Vanessa Redgrave, who is an UNICEF ambassador. She should have asked Mickey Rooney for a few tips on how to put on a show. For the only other pop act was Scots legend Lulu. The rest of the line-up was a weird mix of Albanian rappers, Italian opera singers and a choir of Canadian miners!

But, in terms of entertainment, this was the biggest thing to happen for weeks in a city where nothing seems to happen anymore.

After the sound check, Big Country and I went for a wander around Pristina. And nothing could have prepared us for the sheer devastation. But they got a warm welcome. Some kids joined them for a kickabout with a ball. Then we went to an art college which has become mission control for a squad of Royal Marine Commando reservists. They're part of the UN peacekeeping force in Kosovo and it's their job to help the locals get their lives back together. Sergeant Major Frank McKenna, a schoolteacher from Glasgow, said; "There's never a dull moment. We get 300 people - homeless, poor, the maimed, the bombed in our door every day." They all need help. So we try to assist them."

Word has spread fast that there was a pop group in town. It seemed that everyone turned out to see Big Country. First they had to endure a series of Vanessa's thank-you speeches which would have put Gwyneth Paltrow to shame. Then she introduced Peruvian flute players, opera singers and rappers. Next, Braveheart actor Angus McFadyen recited a poem and got the slow handclap.

The kids of Kosovo just wanted to rock. Luckily, Lulu was happy to oblige. Then Big Country hit the stage, and the audience leapt around. And their finale, Keep on Rockin' In The Free World, was so apt.

Stuart said; "We hope this has brought some fun back into the kids' lives. "It was unbelievable and we won't forget it for a long, long time."

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BIG COUNTRY IN KOSOVO

A guick summary on the recent Big Country visit to Pristina, Kosovo.

Conceived by Vanessa Redgrave and co - arranged by Bill Kenwright, Big Country returned from Kosovo on 13th September with an experience under their belts never to be forgotten.

Having arrived on Friday 10th in Skopje, Macedonia they drove under United Nations / Kfor escort to Pristina on Sunday 12th for "The Return" concert. The event was launched on Friday 10th with an introductory concert in Skopje featuring Philip Glass and followed by a reception arranged by the British and Canadian ambassadors.

The trip to Pristina was an eye-opener. Having gone through the newly constructed border between Macedonia and Kosovo the band witnessed a cement factory commandeered by the Serbs that had been raised to the ground by cruise missiles. Then row after row of burnt out houses and a constant stream of Kfor vehicles but, the most shocking of all was seeing a group of people huddled over what they were told was a freshly found grave.

On arriving in Pristina after soundcheck they were introduced to an under 12 football team and had photos taken, only to be told after that these boys were all orphans. As Bruce Watson said afterwards, the "emotional rollercoaster" had just begun. The band saw many sites for themselves showing the dramatic and shocking results of cruise missile, tomahawk and smart bomb attacks. The first one seen was what was The Serbian Secret Police headquarters. Then a visit to the Royal Marine Commandos (who were mostly Scottish) for some serious talk about the war and light relief for both parties in sharing a few beers. These soldiers have only been visited by Tony Blair and Prince Charles (the day after BC) and the band. So they rather appreciated the impromptu visit.

Then the band stumbled across more bombings including what was the communications centre and post office that the Serbs took over. None of the band or those with them had seen anything like it. Not only was the huge building mangled but so were most of the surrounding houses. A night-watchman appeared and offered to take all the party into the building and up 10 floors to witness the devastation. The band were shocked to say the least. More so when the escort gave his version of the Serb invasion when he and his family were given 2 minutes to leave their house.

The gig itself was somewhat bizarre. A real mixture of music and even poetry. Opera from Albania, Pop from France, a troupe from Chile, and many others. But it was "rock music" the audience was waiting for. Lulu paved the way and was quite remarkable. Hardly looking any older from her heyday of the 60s.

But it was Big Country who woke the whole event up. The audience went wild and the band turned in a brilliant performance. Billy Sloan of the Scottish Sunday Mail said "I have never seen the band in such good form, they were absolutely brilliant". The crowd loved every minute and were still chanting "Beeg Cuntry" when leaving the hall to go home.

The whole three days were documented by a camera crew and we have some stunning pictures as well as digital camcorder footage throughout the entire weekend.

The band have a very personal take on what they witnessed in Kosovo. Last Sunday a half page picture of Vanessa Redgrave giving the band a plaque to mark their participation in the Scotland for Kosovo gig in Glasgow at the end of May, appeared in the Sunday Mail.

Bruce Watson Diaries: Kosovo

Day 1

After a two-hour flight from Munich to Skopje our charismatic yet unlucky singer Stuart gets pulled by Macedonian customs officers and is given a full body search. This included the dreaded 'Digit up burn' procedure that scares the hell out of Rock bands the world over. Cries of 'Didn't they buy you a drink first'? And 'You lucky bastard' echoed around the tour bus. On the road from the airport to the hotel we pass comfields growing on either side. The farmhouses in the fields are basic shacks and there is a strong military presence here with two Apache helicopters hovering above us. A convoy of KFOR and aid vehicles drive by and in the distance we can see the high mountain ranges that lead to Kosovo, Our base for the weekend is the Hotel Continental in Skopje, which according to the brochure has 'State of the art service by provided by highly competent staff. This is of course a complete lie as two days after I accidentally break the flusher in my bathroom it still hasn't been repaired. In fact the sanitation was so bad that when guests asked directions for the toilets they were simply told, 'Just down the corridor mate, follow you nose'. Billy Sloan and Ronnie Anderson (photographer) from the Sunday Mail are out to do a story about the band over the next few days. Also here is the West End theatre impresario Bill Kenwright, who along with Vanessa Redgrave has organised the event. In the restaurant I was introduced to the 'Men of the Deeps' Canadian Miners Choir who coincidentally worked in the same pit that my dad worked in back in 1962 (small world). These guys take a ten-week break from mining every year and go out on tour singing about life down the mines. Their songs are guite heart rendering and their cheeriest song 'Dust in the air' contains the chorus. 'Dust in the air, all through the mine. It's concrete on your lungs and you're old before your time. 'In the foyer we were presented with a plaque from Vanessa on behalf of the Sunday Mail for performing at the Scotland for Kosovo gig in Glasgow. Vanessa has the energy and enthusiasm of a small child and talks non-stop. She invited us to a modern jazz concert in the evening where Phillip Glass is performing. Modern jazz is not my bag and Stuart said it just made him chuckle but we decided to go along and show face anyway. After a twenty-minute speech



from Vanessa, which then had to be translated for the locals, Philip took to the stage. Things were going along just fine until he introduced an avant garde clarinet player to accompany him. The second he put his 'bugle' to his lips and 'farted' out the first note Stuart and I just creased up laughing hysterically. We immediately covered our mouths with our hands to stifle our guffaws but this made it even worse as we couldn't breathe properly. Every time the clarinet player 'tromboned' another jazz lick it just cracked us up. Tears poured from our eyes, snot bubbled out our noses and both of us started sweating profusely. At one point I had to pull my jersey over my head. I immediately tried to think about mundane things like hoovering or watching a Pars game to take my mind off him, but that didn't help. All of a sudden for some insane reason I thought about starting a Mexican wave and that was it. My under pants were now damp as I was losing control of my bladder. When Philip and 'Bugle Boy' brought the music to a climax, the crowd rose to it's foot and applauded, Stuart who was now under his seat crying, got up and ran out with me right behind him. He would never listen to the clarinet again. Back at the bar we banged into Lulu whose bandleader, Alan Derby comes from Dunfermline. Also in attendance is Angus McFadyen who appeared in Braveheart as Robert the Bruce whose body was buried in Dunfermline. Is that a link?

Lulu is over here to sing her big hit 'Shout' and Angus is going to do a poem about death. Angus may be a great actor but his pool playing and sportsmanship leaves a lot to be desired. He was severely thrashed by Shorty and didn't take it to well. Lulu looks great and has a fantastic bubbly personality. Angus on the other hand has a face like a flitting and no personality. In fact Angus is so dour he makes Victor Meldrew seem positively happy. If Ghandi were alive today he would surely strangle him.

Day 2

We boarded the buses at 08.00 and prepared ourselves for the long drive to Pristina. The Italian Carabinieri are escorting us. On the way Aid trucks are held up trying to get through the border as the queue is around five miles long. We pass a lot of burnt out farm buildings and abandoned cars. Our convoy arrive in Pristina around midday and we are ushered to the gig which is right next door to the police headquarters that was bombed during the war.

As usual we got our priorities right and set of to find a football. Once procured we got a game going with Angus and some of the local children. Not only did they hammer us but they also stole the ball.



Billy organised a meeting with some of the guys from the Royal marine commandos. Their head quarters were opposite the derelict building and they welcomed us with open arms. They were mostly from Scotland and had had a visit from Vanessa Redgrave the previous day and were expecting Prince Charles the next day. As you can imagine they were extremely pleased it was a bunch of fellow jocks who were visiting them today which meant they didn't have to dress up, hide their scud books or mind their language in front of more 'luvvie darlings'. Suddenly a heavy Glaswegian voice from the back of the room bellowed forth. 'Vanessa Redgrave ye say, I thought it was fuckin' Vanessa Phelps who wis comin'. Big Mick was as wide as he was tall and like all the lads in the squad had a great sense of humour. I suppose you would need a large one if you had to deal with the problems these guys have to face. On the wall of one office were Polaroid's of children. It didn't dawn on me at first, but these were pictures of missing children. Like myself, most people I know who have young children worry like mad if their bairns are a few hours late or if one goes missing in a busy supermarket. Most of these kids have been missing for months. A few more horror stories were intertwined with some of the funniest jokes I have ever heard and I must salute Mick, his squad leader Frank and all the rest of the guys out there as they are extraordinary people and do an excellent job keeping the peace.

Through the office window we could plainly see the bombed out Police building, a young lad around the age of ten popped up from a hole in the ground and threw out a spent shell casing. Up on the top of the dangerously crumbling building were two teenagers collecting scrap metal. After soundcheck we decided to go and check out the local market, which was so big, it made the Barras look like a car boot sale on a wet Saturday morning. The market specialised in fruit, fags and dodgy Levi's. Ronnie the Smudger bought a pair only to discover that the pockets hadn't been stitched up, unlike his good self. Further into the city centre, the pavements were choc a bloc with young entrepreneurs selling everything from bootleg cassettes to flick knifes and laser pens. We must have walked about a quarter of a mile when suddenly in front of us stood the remains of the post office. It was quite a high building and I was amazed it was still standing. There was a huge gaping hole in the middle of it. This was the main telephone exchange so it was one of the prime targets. Just as we were about to take a closer look a young man came out of the building and started speaking to us in pretty good English. It turns out he used to work in the post office but was away in Dusseldorf when the shelling

started. He was now employed as a security guard and invited us in to the building to have a look round. It was still very unstable but he knew the safer areas. We carefully climbed the stairs to the top of the building, most of the time the banisters were missing so it was a sheer drop. At the top we could see most of the surrounding damage. The air conditioning unit that was once housed on the roof of the post office had been blown off and was now residing on the hotel roof across the road. Further to our left was a washing machine embedded in a wall. The middle of the building had a huge hole that ran from the top to the bottom where the missile had struck it. False ceiling tiles hung by their wires and burnt out circuit boards littered the floor. Ronnie shot some film off and we made our way back downstairs.

We invited the security man over to the Pink Panther bar for a drink with us. He told us his house had sustained some damage after the bombing of the post office. When he returned from Dusseldorf to find his family in a partially destroyed home he decided that he should make some plans to take refuge. He asked his neighbour who was a policeman to help him get his family out of there. His neighbour took him to the police HQ and was told by his superiors that he should take him back home and shoot him. Luckily he decided to let him go and he and his family escaped to a refugee camp and spent months living in a tent. He is now rebuilding his life slowly but surely and I wish him all the happiness in the world.

Back at the gig Lulu is posing for photos with squaddies while Angus is alone in a tent rehearsing his death poem. Vanessa takes the stage and starts reciting another speech that was so dull and monotonous that I was forced to give her a damn good listening to. Various clog dancers and Jazzers get up and strut their stuff which really warm the audience up, not! Angus is up next with 'The poem of Death' which incidentally goes down like a cruise liner hitting something large and frozen in the middle of the Atlantic. He wasn't impressed, but then again neither was the audience. It is only when Lulu gets up and sings 'Shout' that the place goes nuts. Big Country are up next and when Bill Kenwright introduced us as 'The best rock 'n' roll band in the building' you just knew he wasn't wrong. On the return drive back to the Macedonian border everyone with the exception of Vanessa and Lulu decide to get of the bus to do what comes naturally. Five minutes later everyone gets back on the bus totally relieved. That is everybody except Angus who had the entire bus in stitches when he slipped in the biggest puddle of raw sewage I have ever seen.

And they said tragedy is dead.



BIG COUNTRY: The Problems They Have

As a lot of people here know, BC have a problem. When they first came on the scene, they were welcomed with opened arms into the music world. Along with the likes of U2, The Alarm and Simple Minds they were tipped for great things. The music these four bands (and others of the same ilk) generated was LOVED my millions around the world. Don't get me wrong, all these bands worked their socks off to get to that stage, constant touring and recording getting them there. BUT the music they played was lapped up by so many, Record Stores stocked their releases by the barrowload, Radio Stations fell over themselves to play the material, the music press ran article after article on them, and from this exposure the music buying public bought the albums and singles, and such was the demand these artists could have released an album of them farting, and still loads of people would have bought it.

As we all know, U2 hit the Big Time after Live Aid, and every album since has sold millions of copies around the world, and virtually every single has made the Top 10. (Latterly, I would have preferred to hear Bono & Co. release an album of farting, as opposed to the (IMHO) drivel the have released recently). Interestingly enough, it is rumoured that the new U2 album will see a return to the Mid-80's "sound" (Unforgettable Fire, Joshua Tree, War - arguably their best 3 albums). Simple Minds also saw a similar "explosion" at Live Aid (just after Don't You Forget About Me had been released) and the subsequent album Once Upon A Time was a huge selling album, and although other albums never quite reached the same heights, they all sold well. The ALARM came close, but never quite made it (unfortunately), and by 1991 they were no more.

BC didn't get the same breaks as SM and U2.

They had Record Company problems, due to those that believed in them leaving the Record Company and being replaced by people on a fast track to making a quick buck and climbing the Industry Ladder. Coupled with the fact that some producers were NOT the right choice, a drop in promotion (Radio, TV, Posters, Mailouts etc) as the new "powers-that-be" did NOT believe in the Band, and too many other background factors, BC saw their sales, and consequently, their fan base dwindle. Moves to other Record Companies did not work out, due to several reasons (lack of funds for instance for promotion).

The amount of people who ask me "Are they still going?" or say, "I thought they split up years ago" highlights this fact. And that's what it is - A FACT.

Big Country HAVE a mountain to climb. I think we would be kidding ourselves if we thought otherwise. BUT we have seen through website recently, and with the release of FT and DTD, that there is AN AMAZING amount of people out there who are interested in the Band, and want to hear the new material.

Now, at the end of the Century, things are beginning to fall into place. The band now have the following: -

- A Record Company that believes in them.
- 2) A Manager that believes in them.
- 3) The best promotional team the band have had in many years plugging the band, and they ARE making inroads.
- 4) Record Stores seeing a demand they are Genuinely astonished at.
- 5) Heavy airplay of FT on Radio 2 (the most listened to Radio Station in the UK) in the UK (which has an audience of 11.5 million DAILY incidentally higher than Radio1)
- 6) Media attention (admittedly thru' the CIN FT situation)
- A brilliant album, well produced, and containing the best songs the Band have recorded in years.
- 8) An amazing fan base, still loyal to the band after all these years.

Combine ALL these factors together and BC are in the BEST position they have been in years. Now there is an awareness of BC which has not been known for many years. The Internet has played a large part of this, and shall continue to do so, as technology moves forward. But, the awareness of Joe Public has not been raised enough. It needs to be raised even more.

That is why we have to UNITE as FANS and get behind the Band. It's in your hands.......



BIG COUNTRY CONVENTION: 18th September 1999

The first time I saw the Royal Holloway it seemed perfect from just about every perspective; a proper venue for the gig, a wonderful main building, cheap accommodation, and last but not least they seemed genuinely enthusiastic about holding the convention. This had certainly not been the case with every other potential venue I had contacted. I got a range of responses from a polite decline to virtually open hostility! Willie and I went to see the venue again a few days later and I think he was equally impressed, so it was all systems go. The job of liasing with the venue was handed over to Willie, and I took a back seat with only the occasional involvement, up until about a week before the event, when it was all hands to the pump to make sure things were organised. The CC committee met on the Saturday before the convention and we left feeling reasonably confident that everything was going according to plan....how wrong could we be! I was away in Brussels on the Monday and Tuesday, but when I got back all was not well. We had been given a bit of a run-

around all along by the Uni. over catering. The idea had always been to have a Barbecue in the courtyard of the Founders Building. I won't bore you with the details, but basically by the Tuesday night the whole thing was a mess, not of our making but of the UNY's. Basically, we didn't have any catering! I told Willie that I would get involved, because I really wanted the food to be served in the Founders Building so everyone could enjoy the magnificent surroundings. I contacted the Uni. and put my foot down, and they finally agreed to provide a buffet in the Founders Building. In hindsight, I think I antagonised a certain person in the Uni., and from then on our troubles mounted! There had been an ongoing problem between the Uni and us., regarding finalising numbers, and providing names and addresses of people attending.



This was critical for the Students Union as the S U Hall did not have a public entertainment licence and everyone attending had to be made a temporary member of the S U. The university had given us a deadline of Wednesday night to come up with this information, but for many reasons we couldn't achieve this. By Thursday morning things were going nuclear! The Uni. was threatening to cancel the event! I agreed with Willie to pop down to the Uni. at lunchtime to deliver some posters to use around the campus, and when I was there to see if I could smooth things over. When I arrived the buggers were waiting to pounce and I was surrounded by 4 people wanting answers to questions I just didn't have! By this time we had provided a lot of names.... the entire cc database plus everyone who had booked via the web, but this was not good enough apparently, and I had to get the balance of the names to them by 4.30pm or the event was off! Not only that, but payment had to be made in full (no cheques please, cash or a bankers draft only!) and a signed contract returned by first thing on the Friday morning. This was especially tough, as we had never been given a draft contract, so it was kind of tough to sign something you didn't have. We failed to hit the 4.30 deadline, but I assured the Uni. that we would have everything they required before start of business on Friday. After many conversations with the Uni., Willie and Ian Grant, I finally called the Uni. again on the way home at around 7.00pm and they cancelled the event!! I was driving down a country lane at the time and nearly came off the bloody road! If I could have got down on my knees and begged I would have! I rang Ian and Willie, we agreed to carry on and get the additional names required and hope that we could change the UNY's mind in the morning, whilst at the same time consider a contingency plan. Thursday night was hectic, highly alcoholic and long; finally falling into my pit at around 2.30 am pissed as a fart, but unable to sleep. The data the Uni. required was finally sent at around 10.30pm that night by Ian Grant, together with an appeal against the UNY's decision. I agreed with Ian that I would make myself available for the whole day on Friday, so I could react to whatever needed doing. Friday morning I went into the office and booked the whole day off (this confused a lot of people!). Ian and I had a conference call with the University, and he was brilliant! Measured in every word with just the right amount of aggression. By 12.30pm on the Friday the event was on again, providing lan signed the contract by 2.30 pm and had the money to Uni. before the end of the day. This was a bloody tall order since Ian still didn't have the contract. I was due to meet Willie at the Uni. late in the afternoon, so I went home to get my gear. Needless to say the 2.30pm deadline wasn't met and the Uni. cancelled the event again at 3.00pm! By this time I decided to go to the pub! The Uni. was completely full, but luck was on my side when Fiona (Ian Grant's PA) rang in sick.

I have to say that the thrill of watching the band performing live at an event that I was involved in organising was such a huge thrill, it really made up for every anxious moment we suffered!

Driving To Damascus - As Mark's galloping drums kicked in on the driving (pun intended) riff near the 10 second mark, my face split into a wide grin that seemed to be stuck there for the next 50 mins or so. Such a thrill to finally hear some new BC, and it to be this good..! I've always had a thing for the big thumping drums (a'la River of Hope, Blue on a Green Planet), so it's a blast to hear those again. Great guitars, catchy chorus.

Dive Into Me - Very good, much improved from the "Scud" version. Also the solos are most reminiscent of the BC sound of old in this bunch of songs. I can't quite decide yet if the changed lyric in the chorus is an improvement or not.

See You - I actually like this one a lot. It has a very catchy melody and poignant lyrics. This could very well become a hit, given airplay. However, I can see how the strings might upset the "purists". ;-) Although I do agree that the string break midway through the song sounds overly dramatic.

Perfect World - Another brilliant rocker, right up there with the title track. Has an energetic "twin guitar attack", and... what was that phrase again? Oh yeah, riffs like crazy!

Somebody Else - BC goes Del Amitri, both musically and lyrically. Combines upbeat music and a sad subject matter with sort of light-hearted lyrics, and it works like a charm. Has a cool bouncy quitar lick.

Fragile Thing - Still a great, hauntingly beautiful ballad. Eddi fits in perfectly.

President Slipped - I wasn't expecting much from this after having heard the live version from last year, but to my surprise I liked it immediately - there is a melody to this song after all! The hardest rocker on the CD has some very good guitar work from the dynamic duo. :-) A song about the media's desperate hunger for more and more outrageous and absurd 'news'. (?) I do think the "yeah yeah" part sounds a bit awkward, though.

Devil In The Eye - Interesting change of style/sound. At first I thought this was only included because of the Davies involvement, but after a few listens I think it has its place here. Took a while to get into, but grows on you. One thing though, the distorted vocals bit doesn't work for me, although I can see they were going for extra effect there.

Trouble The Waters - Very interesting rhythmically and has a good melody. I was a bit at loss about the lyrics at first, so thanks to Xian and others for telling what the song is about! I really like how Stu again contrasts such sinister subjects with upbeat music. Also good to hear some mandolin by Bruce "Well he's the best mandolin player in this band!" Watson...

Bella - This is the only one that doesn't do much for me, sounds like b-side material. A simple song that, as others have pointed out, seems like the guys are just having fun in the studio. I would have chosen "Living By Memory" (I still can't believe they did not make a true studio version of this!) or "I Get Hurt", or "Loserville" instead.

Your Spirit To Me - Simply stunning. This one almost brings a tear or two into my ole' eyes. Has a great atmospheric feel with a simple melancholic guitar lick which somehow connects deeply with me... maybe it's the Nordic character in me. Wonderful lyrics too, and I like how the song builds momentum towards the end. Simply stunning (did I say that already? :-)

Grace - A very strong song to close the album with. Great crunching guitars all around, and Tony and Mark really warming up too. (Side note: I think "Loserville" would've made an excellent final track as well) Is that Rafe on backing vocals towards the end? ("Into the heart of me, to every part of me...")

All in all this is a fantastic album, easily among their best. To say it's better or worse than, say, Steeltown is rather pointless – they are so different, yet both are bloody marvellous! I really like the production on the album as well, Rafe McKenna has done a great job. The CD booklet design is very good too (btw, looking at the bar pics, has Stu started smoking, or is it just a prop?). At the moment my fave tracks would be Spirit To Me, DTD, PW and Somebody Else.

This album has so much potential to be a HUGE success, if only the general public were given a chance to hear the songs. But the attitude of people in radio etc. is just too much for us mere mortals to understand: IG said on a recent post on the bulletin board that when "Perfect World" was offered to UK Radio 1, the response was that "if this was by a young band, it would go straight to our 'A' play list"! [i.e. but because it's BC, we'll not play it] Boggles the mind.

DRIVING TO DAMASCUS: THE ALBUM

Slightly similar guitar sound thru most of the album - most like Wildland In My Heart/Message Of Love from WTLF - but slightly more rough guitar sound overall.

There is a lot for BC fans to take away here - I have a feeling much of this will grow on me, perhaps even more than WTLF did.

The bonus tracks are welcome; a slight problem is that they slightly detract from the album ending impact - a bit like the bonuses on the US version of WTLF. But they do make me want to hear more BH stuff. With the exception of "Bella", the album gets better as it progresses on, which I find more rewarding than the other way round.

Listening again to Dust on the Road and Loserville, their sound would have fitted fine on the album - so, for me, BC maintain their knack of ditching some classics to obscure B-sides!

I'm real glad that the quintet of songs: Trouble The Water, Grace, Loserville, Dust On the Road and Your Spirit To Me have emerged, with Fragile Thing coming up to join them rapidly. For me, these are all classics- excellent pieces of songwriting and music, and a direction that I hope will grow. Not the old BC sound - which may well have finally past away - but damned fine. I'm looking forward to the tour!

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Interview with Stuart Adamson

Channel 4 Teletext 14th October 1999, Title: BACK TO THE BIG COUNTRY

Not a million years ago Big Country were the biggest thing since, well, U2 - anthemic rock of a tartan persuasion roared around the world's stadiums.

Stuart Adamson was a Premier League rock god, full of strident political opinions and stonking tunes. And then it all went quiet over there. Four years of quiet. What happened?

As Big Country resurface with a new album Driving To Damascus, Stuart Adamson tells us where he's been....
"I went to Nashville....." says Stuart Adamson, as if this explains why we haven't heard a peep from Big Country in these long, lonely four years.

Odd to think of a mad Scots rocker let loose in the country music capital of the world but Adamson loves it. He even has a hair salon there with the Dixie Chicks among his clients.

"I don't do any hairdressing myself but its great. I love the climate. I went to do some songwriting and stayed"

Stuart Adamson spent all Saturday at NetAid waiting on the nod to go on stage and introduce the next guest. The nod never came. George Micheal's set overran, apparently. So it was "Sorry Stuart, thanks for flying in from Nashville but we just don't have time for you, mate, okay?" Stuart was furious, right?

"Och no, I didna mind, it was great just hanging out seeing a bunch of people. I thought Bowie was amazing."

Big Country have a brand spanking new album Driving To Damascus in the shops - is it any good then, or what?

"Oh aye" says Stuart Adamson, perhaps a tad predictably. "I'm really proud of it. My songwriting has improved so much since I went to live in Nashville and I think that shows."

Do you wear rhinestones now? "Nooo!! I just fell in love with the place. I was brought up on Hank Williams and Patsy Cline. And I love the weather!"

Last month Big Country, arriving in an armoured car, played a benefit gig in Kosovo, organised by Vanessa Redgrave.

"It was unbelievable. It brings it home to you about precision bombing. Next to the stadium there's a sports centre and all these other buildings, and in the middle of it there's a hole where they bombed the Serbian secret police HQ."

"The people are phenomenal and the gig was crazy. It made me ashamed of man's inhumanity to man," he said.

Was Stuart Adamson scared when he arrived in Kosovo for his recent gig there with Big Country?

"No, we were in the hands of the forces and one thing I have learned is that British squaddies are more than capable of looking after you," he said.

"It does bring it home to you, though, seeing the damage. We drove up through Macedonia and seeing the refugee camps you realise this is the reality of people's lives."

Stuart Adamson is still smarting over the way the last Big Country single Fragile Thing was banned from the charts for having too much cardboard!

"Och I dunno ... the chart people CIN have these rules and decided it was illegal 'cos the packaging had more than four folds. It was upsetting 'cos it was selling well. Utter Madness!"

Do you keep up with all the trendy new bands on the block, Stuart?

"Och no! Now why would I wanna do that?"
