Well in brief as most of you will know, since issue 3(right.... stop that heckling at the back!... right, who said JEHOVAH!) the band parted company with Vertigo/Phonogram.to then sign a 5 album deal with COMPULSION/CHRYSALIS records on 24th February 1992(see main feature). Having totally re-recorded NPLH tracks 'Ships'and 'We're Not In Kansas'and additionally 'Rockin'In The Free World'in Apr 11 92'the band commenced recording the of STONKINGLY, STU-TASTIC new album 'THE BUFFALO SKINNERS'on 12 August 1992 at RAK Studios.Londinium(what have the Romans ever done for us!?!).Co-produced by BC and Chris Sheldon(who's engineered for Tim Palmer of 'Save Me'fame), fourteen new songs were demoed for the album - 10 of which made it to vinyl/silicone implants, along with the revamped 'Ships'& 'Kansas'. The tracks featured top session MAN...Simon Phillips on the drum stool.He recorded his drum tracks in 6 days after hearing most of the completed demo versions only once!!According to Ian Grant, 'He got back into the country and by the next day he had copies of the demos. The day after that he was in the studio starting the recording!Six days later he was finished!'

All of the songs were written in May and June 92'. Ian Grant and Chris Briggs(the Big Chief)had suggested that some of the band's old unused ideas should be investigated.but Stuart and the band were on such a songwriting 'roll' that old ideas weren't needed. In fact, so great was the 'roll' that Stu even had a potastudio with him at the studio in order to get down any 'out of hours' ideas!(Ouch!Must have been a bastard to carry round when he wanted to go for a MDD...mid day dump!)Both Bruce and Tony 'worked like Trojans'on the album and contributed songs and ideas as well as downing the odd flaggon of Tango no doubt!The recorded tracks were mixed by Dave Bascombe and Mike Fraser who had to depart early to start mixing on the new Aerosmith LP.

And as if to cap it all the release of the new single, album and tour saw the return old Unpronouncable name himself......MARK BRZEZICKI.....confused?....!*'s done our swedes in!?!

But hark, what of us? Wher's nave we been for the last 6 or 7 years...or since October 91' to be precise!(the last time an issue of Inwards surfaced Den and Angie were still running the Queen Vic).Hands up who'd thought we'd done a runner Ronnie Biggs-style with all your lolly?...Cheers then thanks for the vote of no confidence. So had the editors of INWARDS committed ritual suicide or pernaps entered the trappings of a monastic lifestyle?I should cocoa!The real reasons for the delay in publishing issue 4 laid in lack of band activity(at least we've got something to show for the last 18 months you cheeky wee - Bruce)and work commitments/hic-ups(editors shites! adopt serious tone of voice unheralded in Inwards history). Great difficulty was experienced in assembling issue 4. The fanzine was typed and part designed at Jason's place of work(bloody day jobs!).As a result of increased work pressure followed unaviodably by redundancy(whoops.no day job!)issue 4 was badly hampered until other means of getting the job done could be found. Apologies for the delay and also to those who never had a reply to their letters requesting the whereabouts of issue 4.It was becoming a joke, writing to readers giving an expected date of publication only for the issue not to materialise for the above reasons. Thankfully things seem to be Hunky Dory now so please start writing to us again!

Anyway,thats enough of our sob story...we won't be taking up the option of voluntary euthanasia quite just yet(hangings to good for 'em! - Readers voice).On with the show...ONWARDS and INWARDS....tally ho!!

Just as at a football match there's 10,000 would-be managers harranging and airing their opinionated mutterings every time the centre-half balloons one over the cross-bar, so there will always be a legion the band who will offer their "nonof fans of professional "theories on what is essentially right and wrong (us editors included).

For the book,the NPLH tour proved to be a success given the swiftness in which it was packaged together. A mission in pyrotechnics in itself. A success indeed...and that's before we've even mentioned the resultant fufilment "YOU" out there experienced via the bands performances. Ask yourselves this. Which would you have preferred? A Big Country tour or *not*. The latter being reality had the tour commenced in Jan 92' as scheduled, cancelled as direct effect of the bands split with Phonogram.

So what, pray tell, is he preaching you jeer?Lets 'kiss ass' the next time we get a wee bit sceptical over management and for that matter, band decisions?No.but a little understanding 19.85 patience a virtue. That's not to suggest that decisions are ever regretted or made rashly. There were certain regrets as to including the sleeve notes on the NPLH sleeve, inviting certain attack from would-be hacks plus slight retrospective disapprovements with the albums track listing. There were also reservations, in hindsight, to the inclusion of the piano/acoustic version of 'Ships' as opposed to the electric version played in the live arena. Any band disolution with this period in time will probably surface in current press interviews.

On a different note it's great to see the band settled with a new record deal...and a new lease of life!And with that I conclude.The balls in your court.Draw your own conclusions.Part of the purpose of INWARDS COMMENT is to hopefully stimulate debate.So howsabout a few letters folks.Just remember ,dodgy packages that go tick-tock.tick-tock...BOOM!! are not . I repeat. not excepted!!



THE DEALTO END ALL DEALS!

QUILL HAS TOUCHED PAPER. On Monday Country 24th February 1992 Big ended their then 3 months in the wilderness by signing to COMPULSION records. The signing was prompted 3 months earlier by their split with Phonogram, a amicable long standing partnership that had commenced way back in the mists of 1982. The coincidence between then and now?The same man the other side of the signing table. . Chris Briggs. In 1982 head of A & R at Phonogram. In 1992.ten years later on Managing Director of COMPULSION records.a subsidiary of CHRYSALIS/EMI(just as Vertigo and Mercury were subsidiary companies of Phonogram/Polygram).

The Chris Briggs Story

The deal on the table this time is for 5 albums. So who is this man CHRIS BRIGGS the faithful cry?After initially signing BC to Phonogram in 1982, Chris left the company at end of 1984 following the release of 'Steeltown'.Subsequent job changes eventually found Chris at A & M records where he stayed for nigh on 6 years. The reason for his departure from A & M?The plan was to move him into the more pop/dance orientated sector of the company(a disgusting thought by anybody's standards.What sort of low life's running A & M!HA!HA!-eds)As a are result of this Chris decided to set up COMPULSION - his own record company giving him total control over bands to be signed. To the best of our knowledge there have been relatively few releases on the prior to BC(although rumour label has it that legendary 52-piece.arse quaking ministers of skiffle(repect due) Pookiesnackenburger are in the throes of signing a MEGA deal!).

PHONOGRAM OR BUST

So what prompted the split from Phonogram?In brief.there seemed to steadily a declining be understanding in what the band wanted and what Phonogram had in mind. That's not to sav that Phonogram hadn't at times put money and subsidy the bands way - Russia 88'being a prime example.Over ten years since the initial signing in 1982.the bond of enthusiasm and understanding between Chris.the team at Phonogram and the band themselves had dwindled. The nucleus of that team had disolved over the years 39 people departed.most notably Chris himself, to other companies. Inevitably the 'new team' at Phonogram weren't thinking along the same lines as the band. One of the final straws coming when Phonogram cut the B-side of the 'Beautiful People' 12" Picture Disc a full second slow!Promises from the company to the band and managment that the record in question would be recut failed to materialise. The addition of lack of tour funding for the 'NPLH' a 150 turned the screw.It was amicably agreed by both parties that they should go their seperate ways.

SPROUTS!

So why COMPULSION then?Was it quite simply because their old friend Chris Briggs was at the helm?Yes.almost as simple as that. By working with Chris via COMPULSION the band are once again with working someone who understands the bands direction and drive...a fan!(A note of reflection the In those 10 years bands direction has changed as I am sure Chris's ideas on the matter have. Are they STILL ideologically in tandem?Only time will tell.but the signs are very encouraging - An eminent Egg-head)A reflection of this need echoed by the fact that there were more lucrative offers on the table from other companies as well as COMPULSION.



FUTURE DAYS

So to the future. What may it hold for BC? 'Buffalo Skinners' just about puts it in a nutshell.A band revitalised and refreshed by the prospects ahead of them.As a matter of note.Chris Briggs and Steve Lilywhite both attended.at the request of Ian Grant.one of the Oct 1991 Town and Country Club gigs. Steve commented at the time that it was the best he had ever seen the band stating that Phonogram didn't know what it had on it's hands. Steve was also actually sent the mixes of NPLH for his own opinion. In the words of Ian Grant.prior to 'Buffalo Skinners' - "No producer since Steve(Lilywhite)has quite managed to get that live sound or captured the energy of a BC show. They all 'undressed' the band's sound and then redressed it in their own way. In reality, the band already have their sound.it's just getting it onto vinyl." - enter 'BUFFALO SKINNERS' ... here's to what the future holds !!



However, midway through their quest for the ultimate banner headline, the plan was scuppered by the evil Baron Von Graf of Cornwall - Tony Butler to you - who suggested...shock!.. horror! that the whole crew should retire to the pub...!! Quest part one well and truly over!

GOLD BLEND

Well that's where last issues 'chat' with Big Country ground to a rather abrupt halt. But fear not o great reader, for at last INWARDS in association with Fosters lager presents part 2 - "On The Returning From The Pub Whilst Returning To Rockfield". After 8 flagons of ale and sporting a designer squiffy head, the brave and relentless editors of the nation's most (in)expensive pile of shite (bar Derby County F.C. - take that Rob!) were returning to the Rock in the Field. Back at base camp, Bruce and Tony continued the spillage of words/thoughts/ expletives ... Gold Blend firmly at hand. Surely now with a few intoxicating bevvys inside them, Bruce and Tony would be more than forthcoming (well maybe Tony - Bruce was on the Tango!). So without further ado etc., tell us chaps ... what are the prssures of being in Big Country?

M.C. KINKY STU

[B.W.] "Pressures? No pressures."

[T.B.] "The only pressure is coming back to work, getting used to it again."

It's still enjoyable then?

[T.B.] "Oh yeah..even more now I think. Now I do it properly."

Presumably building a steady fan base and groundswell of support aids this?

[T.B.] "Yeah. Fan base, musical experience, background, history. I mean everything just works for you when you're going into the project."

And with this, who should pop in, fully charged from his lusty diet of telly footie, but our man Stu. A ha! a full compliment of band members...time to commence the singling out process. So who's idea exactly was it to add the 'rap' bit to the live version of "Heart Of The World" on the May hits tour of 1990? (ha! ha!)...

[S.A.] "It's hardly a rap bit is it!!"

[B.W.] "It was just a fun thing to do."

[S.A.] "We just spoke the lyrics rather than sing them! We didnae do it every night I don't think. If I had a sore throat I would rap it!"

[T.B.] "We just did it once and it was quite good so we did it again. There was a lot of spontaneous things on that tour which was great."

[S.A.] "That happens all the time anyway. You'll invent something one night and it'll go great and you think we'll need to do that again. The spontaneous things come on like that and sometimes they stick. For me that's what it's all about, it's about capturing the mood of the moment. You get the mood of what's happening there in the hall and you just let things happen. [T.B.] "That's like the Big Countryettes."

[S.A.] "It just happened. It's like how that jam at the start of "Fields Of Fire" evolved."

[B.W.] "We just kept adding to it every single night, another riff and stuff."

IMPROVISATION

So how much of the live set relies on varying degrees of improvisation such as that?

[S.A.] "A lot."

One prime (precious) example of handson stage improvisation developed at the Birmingham Hummingbird gig of May 1990 when Tony's bass packed up leaving Stu stranded as he soldiered on relentlessly kicking out a seemingly 10-minute frenzied and possessed guitar solo. Was that a standard escape route?

[S.A.] "I must have had my guitar-hero head on!"

[B.W.] "I was digging...dig-dig-a-dig-dig(!)."

While we're on the subject matter of gigs, do you have much input/say into tour merchandise, tickets and for that matter, single prices etc.?

[S.A.] "The single prices are set by the record company. Gig ticket prices we've always tried to keep as low as we can."

[T.B.] "We always try to approve the merchandise."

[S.A.] "Sometimes we will do tours on the spur of the moment and the merchandise gets done in a rush. Sometimes bits of merchandise become hip, like we had those vests and the hooded jacket, neckerchiefs and stuff like that. But we think that what happens is that most people end up buying T-shirts and badges anyway, so there's no point in having a big range of it. If it wasn't for the money you get from merchandising, you wouldn't be able to go on the road anyway, because it's so bloody dear to go out and do stuff like that."

[B.W.] "By the time you've hired your bus and lights and P.A. -it's mega."

[S.A.] "I honestly think that ticket prices are really fair, I have to say that. We've always been very aware of that, y'know. The basic is that you get in to see the band and you get into see the band for a reasonable price. I honestly think we have the fairest ticket price out of any touring band and I've always thought that ever since day one."

[B.W.] "We try and get a good support group as well. We try and keep the whole thing as good quality-for-money as you can get. We get sent lots of tapes (from prospective support bands) and we just sit around and say well that's better than that one..."

DWINDLE AND WITHER

What of the bigger venues the band may happen to play? Do they find that their performances become harder to convey? Does the atmosphere dwindle and wither swallowed up by the vastness of the hall, the big cow-sheds and aircraft hagars of this world, N.E.C., Wembley et al?

[S.A.] "It doesnae matter about the place. I think if you care enough about what you do, you can build the right atmosphere anyway. I've always thought that. I think if you do it right it happens. A lot of people just seem to turn up and go through the motions. A lot of the supergroups, like Eric clapton and that, they don't seem to sell a lot of records nowadays, but they always seem to sell out loads of fucking gigs - nineteen thousand nights at the Albert Hall!"

[B.W.] "Think of the money you'd make at that eh?! The gear stays up for the whole month."

[T.B.] "It's a piece of piss that!"

So much of a proverbial piece of piss





that Big Country trotted down that slightly similar road with their 5-night stretch at the Town & Country Club in October. So it was strange in hindsight to hear the band's views on residencies...

SEE MA PUPPIES ...

ERM ... AH !!!"

[S.A.] "No I hate that."

[B.W.] "I must admit, I like to be on the move all the time. It becomes a bit of a residency, like when we did five nights with The Jam at Wembley. It's just too much of a routine."

A sudden change of heart must've befallen the boys eh punters?! Perhaps we put the idea into their heads. As they say...that's rock 'n' rawl y'all. do residencies add to a slight degree of complacency then? Do you still soundcheck daily?

WEIRD ..

[S.A.] "Yes. You have to really just to make sure that the gear's all working and stuff, because the gear's weird. You can leave it one night and it'll be O.K. and you switch it on next day and it's like nothing happens."


This quickly prompts a few posers along the lines of dodgy technical mishaps experienced back in the U.S.S.R. circa 1988. Stuart elaborates...

[S.A.] "We weren't getting enough power. It was just because someone had put me directly through the Soviet mains rather than use a genarator."

Looking back to the infamous Russian "Peace.." trips, failure to bear great fruits (commercially) was further tarred by the practically low-selling "Peace..." album itself. Did this invite pressure from the record company? What's the working relationship with them like at present?

[B.W.] "We get on O.K. with the record company. We get on fine."

[S.A.] "A record company's a (ex!) record company. I think that if you sign to a major label you have to accept all that. There's a lot of benefits and there's always a lot of stuff that goes on that you might think distasteful. Basically a major record label is there because they sell records. That's what their aim is, whatever they can do to sell the most amount of records possible, that's what they're interested in. So there is a bit of to-and-froing y'know. They like to think that they have their input and we like to think that we're completely autonomus but neither could exist without the other really. I don't think you could, especially nowadays, have fulltime touring bands with big productions and albums out if it wasn't for record companies selling a lot of records because it costs shit-piles of money, everything you want to do. I mean even just to hire a van and get your gear about the place, the price is outrageous these days."



ARGUMENTS

Do record company decisions and suggestions ever cause arguments and fracas (heaven forbid) within the band itself?

[S.A.] "Not within the band. No."

So you're not an 'arguing' band like, for example, Jane's Addiction who have been known to fight with one another actually on-stage?

[S.A.] "Not really, no. Apart from Mark!"

[B.W.] "And he's not here!"


Tony concludes


Dear Inwards,



THE BUFFALO SKINNERS IN NURNBERG 11/5/93:

FROM MAY 1st to May 13th Big Country did their first German tour in four years.

It included eleven gigs in the major cities, I managed to see the one in Nurnberg. After I had bought the tickets for my girlfriend & myself it seemed an awful long time until May 11th.

Finally the long-awaited day came. The venue was the 'RESI' which is a relatively small concert hall in the outskirts of Nurnberg. I wouldn't say the gig was sold out as I'm sure that there weren't more than 1000 people there. After IAN McNABB and his band had played for about 45mins Big Country opened their set with 'All Go Together' exactly at 9PM.

What followed was an excellent mix of songs off their fantastic new album and their old hits. The lads seemed to be in a very good mood and Stuart - surprise, surprise wore a head scarf as it is all the mode at the moment. Quite an unfamiliar lock I can tell you. Stuart's voice seemed to be a little bit hoarse - no wonder after having played 8 gigs in 10 days. 'Look Away' got a very good response, probably because it's the best known Big Country song in Germany.

After the harsh 'What Are You Working For' and the slide guitar filled 'Pink Marshmallow Moon'(at the beginning of which Stuart without success, tried to whistle)followed the part which was the climax of the show. The excellent allguitar version of 'Ships' & the rocky 'Long Way Home'(one of the best new songs)made way for a storming 'Wonderland' & the sublime 'Seven Waves'.

They ended their set with a very well received 'Alone' & a very rocky version of 'Fields Of Fire' and would you believe it - 'Chance', during which Stuart intoduced Bruce, Tony & Mark(who was once again absolutely brilliant -Mark's the best, f... the rest). The first encore included 'Chester's Farm'before which Stuart warned never to trust government scientists. 'Lost Patrol' followed, at the end of which Mark was left alone on stage to finish it off with a thunderous drumbeat.

After the audience had sung along for quite a while and had heavily demanded a second encore, they came back and took up 'Lost Patrol' again and brought it to a definitive end(guitar overkill).Next were Blue Oyster Cult's '(Don't Fear)The Reaper'(also a sing-along time) and 'In A Big Country' during which Stuart took a picture of someone in the front row who had given him a camera(what a party trick man).

Because of the tremendous reaction of the audience, they even did a third very rocky(indeed) encore. Having not heard the 70's cover versions on the CD single of 'Ships' I presume it could have been 'Cracked Actor'. After a little bit more than two hours a really vigorous and rocky(who needs keyboards)gig ended.


The guys fully met the expectations they had roused with their new album.

COUNTRY FOLK

It may be early in the morning but Big Country's Stuart Adamson is full of bonhimé and very much awake. Stuart is speaking to me from his home in Dunfermline, which he shares with his wife and two children.


Not quite the cliched image of supposed rock stars. It hardly conjures up a picture of a debauched rock celeb nursing hangovers and chillin' out by their Malibu swimming pools.

However, Stuart Adamson doesn't even see himself as a rock star, as he so succinctly puts it "I've always considered myself as a singer and writer of folk songs I like to play through electric guitars" Stuart expands upon his point "What annoys me a little is that it's ok for a soul group from Detroit to acknowledge and write about their roots and influences. However, some people find it harder to accept it when we are influenced by our own Scottish folk tradition, which I believe is just as valid! I'm not embarrassed about my roots or my Scottish identity'

What are the reasons why you've stayed in Scotland, Stuart? "I think it's important for more Scots' people to stay and work from Scotland and I think there has been a lot of encouraging developments occuring in Scotland recently". Fine sentiments indeed, but back to the music.

Stuart and the boys have a compilation album due out. They also have a new single out entitled 'Save Me' and are currently working on a new album due out towards the end of the year. All this activity plus a new drummer, Pat Ahern, and a UK tour. Stuart is both excited and motivated by the prospect of getting back on the road, after quite a long lay off. "I'm really looking forward to getting out there. Audience participation has always been a big feature of our concerts and I love to strike a chord directly with people that come to see us play"

At the time of your last album 'Peace In Our Time' you made a well publicised trip to Moscow, and bearing in mind the changes in Eastern Europe, would you like to tour over there?



"We'd really like to tour there as well as just doing the regular European countries like France, Germany, and Belgium etc. However, I don't think a rock or pop band con effect changes in these places, but we can contribute something positive".

Who's the new drummer? Was it an amicable split with Mark Brzezicki, the old one?

'Pat Ahern has done a lot of session work with a diverse group of people i.e. Spear Of Destiny etc. When we first met we got on really well. I rely on my instinct and I felt he was the right guy and he's committed to working with the band. Mark always liked doing a lot of session work and he felt he wanted to continue in that vein (Mark Brezezicki is now playing with Fish's touring band) and we needed someone who was more committed. You can't really try and replace someone like Mark and we wouldn't want to do that. It's like a fresh start with Pat".

How do you feel about the release of a 'Greatest Hits' compilation album?

"I'm quite happy with doing a compilation album as I'm very proud of what we've done in the past and it seems like a good time to do it"

Have you any particular favourites from your back-catalogue?

"I'm quite pleased with a lot of what we've done but I wouldn't want to single out anything in particular".

Were you pleased with the last album 'Peace In Our Time'?

Stuart's reply is very honest. "'Peace In Our Time' is probably my least favourite album we've done, I felt the production on that album was too soft, but the next album will be a lot more harder and powerful".

Staying on the theme of big Country's albums, it's noticeable they've worked with some pretty interesting people — like Kate Bush for one!

Stuart fondly recalls the memory. "Aye, we worked with Kate Bush on the 'Seer' album. She was amazing. I sat down with her playing my guitar, working on the idea of the song and within a few hours she had already come up with three or four great ideas for the song".

Moving away from the captivating Miss Bush, Lasked Stuart where he derived his lyrical inspiration from?

"I tend not to write about big events directly, but from the point of view of ordinary people and how events and decisions made by governments affect their lives".

So you think that the Government is out of touch Stuart?

"Governments always lose touch with the ordinary people, which makes it important for the local communities to be strong and supportive".

On a lighter note, he re-iterates by explaining that he still feels fresh and excited about the band's music and if you haven't seen Big Country live or been won over by them on record I recommend you catch them on the forthcoming tour. You won't be disappointed I assure you!
