Stuart personally faxed this lefter to us from his home in Scotland just before we went to print but as the quality was poor, we decided to print it in full as well.

"I'd like to take this chance to write a little bit about some of the moments I remember most vividly within B.C. These are just a few of the moments that have made it all magic for me. There are hundreds more but this is a selection.

 Gigs – anywhere, anytime. This has always been the main thing for me. To have that direct contact with people and to feel the instinctive emotional pull of music has never lost its strength. I think in the past seven or eight years, there have only been five shows that I haven't enjoyed. That's a tribute to people who come to see us as much as to the band.

2) First demos – the first time Bruce and I played with Tony and Mark and knew that the songs and ideas we had would come to fruition. We met at the Polygram Studios in the West of London and recorded three tracks with no rehearsals and they just worked.

3) In a Big Country demo – we had recorded the music during the day and I had an idea for a vocal melody. I was staying with Les King and I'm sure I

kept him up all night getting the words the way I wanted them. I knew just singing along to the back track in his living room that the song was a bit special.

4) The Seer – I had long been a fan of Kate Bush and suggested to Robin Millar that her vocal style would be great on the track. She heard a rough version of the song and liked it and came along to the studio with a whole vocal arrangement. To sit beside her and listen to her sing was very, very moving.

5) Moscow, Berlin and Tallinn:- For me, personally, it was an ambition fulfilled to go and play in the East. The songs from "Peace In Our Time" were particularly poignant there, especially after talking to people in the streets. It has been a great wonder for me to see the East open up and these intensely passionate people given some hope of self-determination.

6) Tim Palmer – sometimes coincidence looks a bit too much like a game plan. After having worked with a very dogmatic (i.e. "my way or no way") producer, it was brilliant to work with Tim who is a great enthusiast and a real music fan. This attitude is very similar to ours inasmuchas he makes records for the love of it and that is always a very inspiring atmosphere to work in. Tim also does a mean line in Skids' covers but that's another story.





SHORT NOTE FROM IAN GRANT, MANAGER:

Mark Brzezicki departed last July to pursue other avenues. He is currently on tour with Simon Townsend (Pete's brother) in America but has worked mostly with Fish since. Pat Ahern is Big Country's new man with the sticks and made his first live appearance with the Band in Dunfermline on 1st May for Rock Steady, broadcast live on Channel 4. For those who were not amongst the 350 audience and for those who missed the broadcast, the Band played for nearly two hours, having only had four days' rehearsal. The somewhat daunting challenge was accepted and Pat proved an exciting addition to the Band's music. It will be strange without Mark, but Pat has slotted in nicely.

The Band have been very busy recently. In February, several songs were demo-ed, resulting in "SAVE ME" and "HEART OF THE WORLD", plus a couple of other "crackers"!

Tim Palmer produced the two songs at the Livingstone Studios in North London, "SAVE ME" being released 30th April and "HEART OF THE WORLD" which will be released at the beginning of June 1990.

Everyone is well pleased with the results and the Band will resume with Tim in August.

Next, the Band were back into the demo studio to 'put down' further songs for their fifth studio album. The making of the "SAVE ME" video followed, produced by Howard Greenbalgh, and is most definitely the BEST YET!

Talking of videos, Channel 5 are releasing a 14 track cassette of all previous Big Country promotion videos. This coincides with the release of a "GREATEST HITS" album entitled "THROUGH A BIG COUNTRY": all formats will be in the shops on 14th May 1990.

Big Country have one extra, live date, on 3rd June, in Glasgow, as part of the "Glasgow Big Day" celebrations and then it's back to the demo studio and commencement of recording of the next album in August.


COUNTRY CLUB

A How would you like to be remembered?



Q What keeps you awake at night?


Stuart: Everything. Bruce: I don't sleep – sleep is for wimps. Tony: My wife... if she phones. Pat: Nothing.
